SOIL TESTING CLINIC FIXED

To Be Held at Sulphur School, Monday, January 17

LET SAMPLES DRY

There will be a soil testing clinic at the Sulphur school, Monday, January 17, from 8:00 a.m. to 12, and at the Henry County courthouse from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., on the same day.

Farmers interested in having their soil tested should take samples now and allow them to become well dried before testing day. Samples can be taken by digging a hole about six inches deep then take soil for sample from top to bottom of hole. At least five samples should be taken per field. These samples are allowed to dry then thoroughly mixed. About one-half pint of the mixed soil is brought in for test.

Mr. S. C. Jones, specialist in soils, will be present to help each farmer interpret his soil reports.

The F.F.A., 4-H Club and G. I. boys will assist in carrying on the testing.
