JOHN TINGLE OF MARYLAND
AND HIS SON, WILLIAM, OF MARYLAND AND DELAWARE

In the 1987 Winter issue (Vol. 1 - No. 2) of our newsletter we carried a history of HUGH TINGLE, progenitor of the Worcester County, Maryland strain of Tingles. Then, in the next issue, there appeared the story of HUGH TINGLE, JR. who removed from Maryland to North Carolina in the 1750's. Now we come to JOHN TINGLE, another son of HUGH, SR. and a brother to HUGH, JR.

Very little is known of JOHN. Of the eight (8) children identified as having been born to HUGH TINGLE, SR. and his wife, ELIZABETH POWELL, a calculated guess is that John was born about 1690-1700. His name first appears in the records in 1723 when he was listed as a taxable, living in Baltimore Hundred of Somerset County, Md. with HUGH TINGLE (his father).¹ Worcester County was not erected from Somerset until 1742. The lands owned by the Tingles were in the extreme northeastern portion of the county on 'the seaboard side'. When the boundary dispute between Maryland and Delaware was finally settled in (1769) with the drawing of the Mason and Dixon line, this portion of Somerset (now Worcester) ended up in Sussex County, Delaware.

John
In 1723 HUGH TINGLE, SR. made his Will and among other bequests he "gives unto my son, John Tingle, the plantation whereon I now live - called by the name of DUMFRIES".² The next sentence provided that if "John Tingle deceases without issue", then the plantation would go to LITTLETON TINGLE, grandson of HUGH and son of SAMUEL who died in 1721. This wording makes it sound as though JOHN TINGLE may not have been married in 1723; however, he could have been married but had no children at that point in time.

In the will of HUGH TINGLE, SR. he (the father) "appointed my well beloved son, JOHN TINGLE, to be whole and sole executor

of this my last Will and Testament". HUGH lived for another ten (ten) years, the Will being probated 22 August 1733.

JOHN TINGLE, as executor, filed an accounting of the estate on 22 January 1734.³ He continues to be listed as a taxable, with his faithful Negro, HARRY, up to 1737. In that year, on the 12th of December, JOHN TINGLE made his Will listing these bequests⁴:

"to son, WILLIAM, plantation whereon I live called DUMFRIES",
"to daughter RODEAH (RHODA), a slave",
"to daughter HANNAH, a slave",
"to daughter MARY, a slave",
"to wife, MARY, one-third of entire estate. She to be sole executrix",
"to my four (4) children, WILLIAM, RODEAH, MARY and HANNAH, residue of estate. Should unborn child attain years of maturity, to have an equal portion with other children."

Who was the unborn child? A reasonable assumption might be that the child was a girl, named Esther. On November 9, 1756, WILLIAM TINGLE and Ananias Hudson, Executors of the Estate of William Richards, filed an accounting and one item of disbursement reads "money due from deceased as guardian of ESTHER TINGLE for the durable part of her father's estate and paid to her by these accountants, 45 pounds, 15 shillings, 0 pence."⁵

Was this WILLIAM TINGLE the son of JOHN and MARY? I am strongly inclined to believe that he was. If so, he was a first cousin of Ananias Hudson, as the latter's mother was MARGARET TINGLE who had married Richard Hudson. MARGARET TINGLE HUDSON and JOHN TINGLE were sister and brother. Ananias Hudson, son of Margaret and Richard, was a bachelor and a man of considerable means. He was older than his cousin, WILLIAM TINGLE.

William Richards, mentioned above, married Margaret Hudson, daughter of Richard Hudson and his wife, MARGARET TINGLE. Therefore, it is easy, though somewhat confusing, to see the relationship between the Tingles, Hudsons and Richardses.

Getting back to JOHN TINGLE, I have been unable to determine the surname of his widow, MARY. Did she remarry after his death? I don't know. On May 14, 1739, MARY TINGLE, as Executrix, filed an accounting of his Estate showing that it was valued at 457 pounds sterling. One of the disbursements was for ten (10) pounds, paid in full to SAMUEL TINGLE, of a legacy left to him by his grandfather, HUGH TINGLE, SR. This young SAMUEL was the son of SAMUEL who died in 1721 and, therefore, a nephew of JOHN, subject of this sketch.⁶

Now we come to WILLIAM TINGLE, son of JOHN and brother to three (3) - probably four (4) sisters, mentioned previously. Of the many Christian (and biblical) names bestowed on TINGLE children, the most difficult to research is WILLIAM. It appears many times in generation after generation.

We know from the aforementioned Wills of HUGH and JOHN TINGLE that WILLIAM inherited the family plantation, DUMFRIES, originally purchased in 1693.⁷ How old was WILLIAM at the time of his father's death in 1737? JOHN TINGLE died very shortly after making his Will. It was probated January 18, 1738.⁸ It would seem that all of his children were minors at the time. WILLIAM was probably the oldest. On June 22, 1745, John Tull and William Hatfield were chosen to value the "plantation and appurtenances belonging to Wm. Tingle, in guardianship of Mr. William Richards".⁹ Probably this is when WILLIAM TINGLE became eighteen years old which would place his year of birth about 1727.

It is unfortunate that the lists of "taxables" (males age 16 and over) for 1741 and 1742 in Somerset County have not survived. Prior to 1741, no WILLIAM TINGLE is listed, even though he had inherited the family plantation in 1738. This would seem to prove that he was not yet sixteen. In 1742, Baltimore Hundred and Boquetenorton Hundred were partitioned from Somerset to form Worcester County. No tax records exist for the latter. What happened to them is lost in the maze of two hundred and fifty years of record keeping or the destruction thereof.

Following the appraisal of WILLIAM TINGLE's plantation in 1745, his name does not appear in any records until 1756 when he made a distribution of funds to ESTHER TINGLE, as previously mentioned in this story. Then it vanishes 'til 1774 when, on April 22nd, WILLIAM TINGLE sells to Elijah Fassitt for "six hundred pounds current money of Maryland, all that tract of land containing 200 acres, known by the name of DUMFRIES. WILLIAM says that he has a good, sure and indefeasible estate of inheritance to this land. ELIZABETH, his wife, is examined and agrees to the sale."¹⁰ After being in the family for eighty years spanning three (3) generations, the land passes to other ownership.

Now at last, we know that WILLIAM TINGLE is married and has a wife named ELIZABETH. Elizabeth who? I think and I emphasize "think", that she was ELIZABETH MILLER, daughter of Captain Joseph Miller who commanded a militia company of fifty-four men in Somerset/Worcester County in 1748-49. While the name, WILLIAM TINGLE, does not appear in this historic old document (I have had the privilege of inspecting the original paper), the names of HUGH TINGLE, JUN^r, HUGH TINGLE, corporal, and SOLOMON TINGLE are listed.¹¹ Joseph Miller's Will was made October 2, 1777 and probated November 4, 1780 in Sussex County, Delaware. It contains a bequest of "Negroes to ELIZABETH TINGLE's children".¹²

WILLIAM TINGLE appears on the list of members supporting the Rev. John Rankin, minister to Blackwater Presbyterian Church near Frankford, Del. and Old Buckingham By-The-Sea Presbyterian Church near the future site of present-day Berlin, Md. The form of support was six (6) bushels of corn annually by WILLIAM TINGLE and varying amounts by other members. The years were 1778-79-80, a trying period due to the Revolutionary War.¹³

Who were the children of WILLIAM TINGLE and his wife, ELIZABETH MILLER? Until further information surfaces that might prove otherwise, we have to rely on his Will made September 20, 1806, Codicil added January 19, 1807 and probated February 17, 1807 in Sussex County, Del.¹⁴ It names the following:

- "my son, JOHN TINGLE"
- "my son, NATHANIEL TINGLE"
- "my daughter, CATTY LONG"
- "my grand daughter, POLLY FASITT"
- "my grand son, WILLIAM COTINGHAM"
- "my grand daughter, HETTEY LOCKWODD"
- "my three grand daughters, CATTEY, MORIAH and HETTEY TUNNEL"
- "my three daughters, COMFORT, EASTER and CATTEY"
- "my daughter, HESEY COTINGHAM"

WILLIAM TINGLE seems to have experienced a long and useful life of about eighty years. His wife predeceased him as her name is not mentioned in his Will. One son, WILLIAM, also predeceased his father, dying in 1800, but leaving no children.¹⁵ A daughter, MORIAH (MARIA) TUNNELL, died before her father.¹⁶

The son JOHN mentioned in WILLIAM's Will appears to have died in November 1807, not long after his father's death. He left two (2) children, MARY (POLLY) and JOHN. The mother of these two (2) children seems to have predeceased her husband.¹⁷ Information about some of WILLIAM TINGLE's children is on file and will be published in a future issue of our family newsletter.

In closing this rather complicated life and history of JOHN TINGLE and his son, WILLIAM, I do not claim it to be without error. There are other WILLIAM TINGLES on the Delmarva Peninsula to be written about. For instance...

WILLIAM TINGLE, father of ANANIAS ROBINSON TINGLE;

WILLIAM TINGLE, father of MANAIN (MANAAN) TINGLE;

WILLIAM TINGLE, son of CALEB TINGLE & ELIZABETH FASSITT

WILLIAM TINGLE, age 15, who landed in Philadelphia, Pa. in 1775. Who knows him?

Are you thoroughly confused by now? If so, join the rest of us.

"CAPTAIN" JOHN TINGLE OF DELAWARE
1815 - 1893

Back in 1978 your editor had the pleasure of receiving an interesting letter from Ms. MARY JANE TINGLE of Wilmington, Delaware which contained an enclosure from her aunt, Mrs. MARGARET TINGLE WISE. Copies of both are reproduced in this issue of our newsletter. Any of our readers who are curious about this line of the TINGLES are invited to correspond with me. I may be able to furnish additional information that has developed from research in the records of the Delaware State Archives.

In order to identify the fifty-nine members of this line more accurately, the individual names shown in Mrs. Wise's letter of October 8, 1978 are grouped below by generation, starting with the initial TINGLE who came from England. At this point in time, his first name is unknown.

My great-grandparents came here from England. I do not know the town they came from. They had two daughters and one son -- John. The two daughters died young, so they never married.

John, who was born December 5, 1815, and died May 11, 1893, married Mary J. Clogg, who was born November 23, 1830, and died September 2, 1894. They had eleven children.

I know very little about my grandmother. She had a brother David Clogg. I vaguely remember Uncle Dave. He had a son John Clogg... I am not sure whether she was born in America, but I never heard of her as an indentured servant -- but I always thought she was English. I do not know where they were married other than in the USA.

★ I think grand-dad worked on a boat and probably had a boat of his own later. The "captain" title may have been honorary. Several men in those days had boats which they used to carry cargo up and down the rivers, as they had no transportation in those days. They had eleven children and my dad was the eldest, John Samuel. He married Jennie Hudson. They had four children: Marybelle - Married William W. Thompson. They had three children; William Lawrence, Margaret, and Anne. Della - married Louis Daisey, had one daughter, Blanche. Margaret - Married William Arthur Wise, had one daughter Barbara. John Samuel Jr. - married Ethel West, had one daughter, Mary Jane. ★

Sadie Tingle never married. Elias married Margaret Hudson and they had seven children, Harvey, Annie, Will, Edward, Asher, Carrie, and Charlie. (*) Asher married Mary Atkins and they had three boys: John A. - married Lula Hudson, had one daughter Betty. Jerry McKinley married Iona Walls, had two children, Priscilla & H. McKinley. Preston married a girl in New York, I forget her name, no children.

Alice married Elisha Holloway. They had two children: Elisha, Jr., married a girl by the name of Dorothy in California. They had two boys.

May married a Philadelphia stockbroker.

Mary - married Harry Tanguy. They had one son, Edward. He married Dorothy Reed from Cleveland, they had one son Charles. They were divorced and he married a girl by the name of Grace from Philadelphia. They had one son, Edward Jr.

Kate - married Irvin Hudson. They had two sons. Addison married a girl by the name of Montie. They had one son (can't remember his name) and a daughter Katherine. Irvin Jr. married Ada Rickards and had three children, Edward, Norma, and Betty.

Mattie Tingle never married.

Lemuel married Sallie Lockwood. They had three children: Toledo - never married, Russell - was killed at 18, never married, and Mildred who married Preston Williams and had two children, Carolyn and Preston.

Toledo married Hannah Long and had two children; Maude who married Norman Jarvis, had two boys and twin girls.

Chester - married Lillian - no children.

Virginia Belle Tingle - never married.

The Philadelphia crowd -- Sadie, Alice, Mary, Mattie, and Virginia are all buried in West Laura Hill Cemetery.

All the others are buried in Roxana and Frankford cemeteries.

I do not know where my great-grandparents are buried, but probably on one of the farms where they had lived.

The article appearing on the following pages entitled, "GREEN BUNYON TINGLE", was prepared by Mrs. Bettie Faulks of Eureka, California. She is a Tingle descendant. We thank her for sharing this information with our readers, some of whom will certainly recognize names therein. Your editor urges others to follow the example of Mrs. Faulks, so that we may all benefit by learning more about our ancestors. It just proves that there is a story to tell about many, many Tingle forebears:

GREEN BUNYON TINGLE 14 July 1834-18 May 1917

Green Bunyon Tingle was born 14 July 1834 in Butts or Monroe County, Georgia. He was the son of John Purifoy Tingle (a son of John Tingle and Sally Purifoy) and Martha Gilpin (daughter of Benjamin Gilpin of Georgia). John Purifoy Tingle was a leading farmer of Monroe County Georgia and a member of the Baptist Church. Green went to Belton, Texas in 1854, at the age of twenty, and married 26 Dec 1854 to Dorothy Jane Wakefield, (daughter of Sam Wakefield and Sarah Lee of Georgia). Green was a prominent thrifty farmer, leading citizen, an Odd Fellow, and member of the Baptist Church. In 1864 he enlisted in the Confederate Army, First Texas battery, and served until the final surrender in 1865. On his return he resumed farming his 484 acres of choice land. He died 18 May 1917/18 at the age of 83 in Mount Pleasant, Titus Co., Texas. Green and Dorothy had possibly nine children (sources differ) some of whom died as infants.

1. Martha Tingle- married ? Raney. She died as a young mother.

I. Tom Raney- reared by grandfather Green Tingle.

1. J.R.Raney lived in Tulsa, Okla. worked for Burroughs Adding machine Co.

2. Charles Tingle II-could be named for his Uncle Charles Tingle. He appears as a son on the Texas Biography of Green Tingle.

3. Thomas Jefferson Tingle-b.ca 1861, he was an accountant by trade. He married ca 1885 Grace Ligon Powell, (a teacher) who was born 11 Dec 1862, Montgomery, Alabama (daughter of William David Powell and Amanda Brooks). She graduated from Baylor University, and was a gifted writer. In 1925 she wrote articles for Liberty Magazine, winning a prize for one such article. As a result she owned the first electric Kelvinator in the town of Muskogee, Oklahoma, where they lived at the time. They also had lived in Waxahatchee and Childress TX.
