A QUICK REPLY!

If you want an answer to a genealogical puzzle, just insert your inquiry in this newsletter. Your editor in the previous issue, asked for help in identifying one Harry K. Tingle, postmaster of Kalida, Putnam County, Ohio. Very promptly came a reply from Mrs. Jackie M. Goldman of Texas. She is a devoted staff member of our paper.

The postmaster turns out to be HARRY KIRSTON TINGLE, born 17 August 1850, who married Lavinia Katherine Vail on 23 January 1873. The possibility exists that "Harry" was a nickname for "Harrison". Harry and Lavinia had five children:

Clarus Legatus Tingle, born 27 July 1878
Paul Vail Tingle, born 17 January 1880
Mabel Hayes Tingle, born 10 February 1882, married
Christopher Robertson of Chicago
James Joseph Tingle, died young
J. J. Tingle, died young.

Harry K. Tingle was a son of Lt. Joseph Tingle and his wife Anna Sophia Cunningham. Joseph Tingle was born 5 May 1824 in Warren County, Ohio, and died 3 April 1913 in Kansas City, Missouri. He was a direct descendant of Jedidiah Tingle (1766-1827) whose biography appeared in Vol. 2 - No. 1 of the newsletter. The latter's great grandfather was Samuel Tingle, first born child of Hugh Tingle of Maryland and his wife, Elizabeth Powell.

STONEWALL TINGLE OF TEXAS AND OKLAHOMA (1863-1929)

Mrs. Ann T. Lila of Mesa, Arizona sent the story and picture below of Stonewall Tingle and his wife, Annie B. He was a direct descendant, in the fifth generation of Solomon Tingle of North Carolina and Georgia. Does any reader know why he changed his name from 'John B.' to 'Stonewall' sometime between 1880 and 1900?



**PROMINENT BUSINESS MAN
AND CHURCH WORKER DIE**

Stonewall Tingle, 66 years old, who is a well known business man and church worker, died at his home 226 North Eighth street yesterday following a brief illness.

Mr. Tingle moved to Muskogee from Dallas in 1903, and engaged in the practice of law here. He later became general agent for an insurance company. He was a member of the First Baptist church and was a trustee for more than 20 years. He was one of the first members of the Baptist hospital board and was a leading factor in its erection.

He is survived by his wife, a brother, Mr. T. J. Tingle, and a sister, Mrs. Sallie Rogers, all of Muskogee. Funeral services will be conducted 2:30 o'clock Tuesday at the First Baptist church, with Rev. A. N. Ho officiating. Burial will be in Greenhill cemetery, under the direction of the Gulpel funeral home.

Son of Green E. Tingle, Mt Pleasant, Texas. They moved to Muskogee, OKLA., from Dallas, Texas, in 1903. A lawyer, Mr. Tingle was in real estate investment and insurance business.

The Muskogee City Directory for 1904-1917 lists Stonewall Tingle as general agent for Pennsylvania Mutual Life Insurance Company.

They are the parents of nine children: Charles, Harry, Nellie, Carrie, Ida, Anna, George, Lucy and Marshall. All lived to adulthood, a rather unusual occurrence in those days. Obediah was born in 1844 and died in 1923 and Lucy was born in 1846 and died in 1926. Obediah served in the Civil War and was seriously injured in the battle of Shiloh. PROUD MEMORIES BLOOMING ANEW!

The story reproduced here from the pages of the Clarksville (TN) Leaf-Chronicle, 15 June 1986, should help renew our faith in human nature. Margaret Tingle, pictured in the rose garden, is the widow of Staff Sgt. Tom K. Tingle who was killed in Viet Nam on 10 April 1966. A paratrooper, he was serving with the 1st Infantry Division when killed. He was the father of three sons: Martin Tingle of St. Augustine, FL; Rogert Tingle of Knoxville, TN and Tom K. Tingle of Wytheville, VA. This clipping and information are from the files of Mrs. Ann T. Lila, Mesa, AZ, a dedicated member of the newsletter staff, who is a sister-in-law of the spunky Margaret pictured herein.

Proud Memories Blooming Anew

Twenty years ago, the 14 were among thousands who died in the steamy jungles of South-eastern Asia.

The rescue of the memories of these

men from another type of jungle, a jungle of underbrush and scrub choking the Municipal Rose Garden, has led to the rebirth of the this proud, green oasis in the shadow of Memorial Hospital.

"I was driving home one night, and I decided to stop here," said Margaret Tingle, as she looked up from her back-bending toil in the rose beds and directed a pitchfork's tines toward a granite marker. "I went over to that bed, which was donated to the city by the widows of the 14 men who died in Vietnam..."

She shook her head in disgust at the recollection of her discovery of the overgrown rose bed. "I wasn't mad. But I was sad."

With good reason. "Staff Sgt. Tom K. Tingle" — the man who married this spunky German woman — is among the 14 names inscribed on the simple marker in one of the garden's 33 beds.

"In the fall of 1966, each of the widows paid \$25 for the bed and it was dedicated in the memories of our husbands," she said.

She pointed out that many of the soldiers were buried in Arlington National Cemetery. Her husband was buried at Fort Donelson National Cemetery in Dover.

"This is kind of an extension of their resting places," she said, explaining that it is easier for the families to visit this garden to pay their respects to the proud men than it is for them to travel to the national cemeteries.

That was what she was doing on the early spring afternoon when she made her sad discovery.

Actually, it wasn't just the memorial rose bed, but the entire rose garden, which was suffering.

This precious garden — a stamp of green and vibrant colors among the neonlit suburban sprawl of quick shops, gas stations, doctors buildings and pharmacies which makes up Hilldale — needed reviving, protecting, she decided.

She at first didn't know what to do. But, she was willing to volunteer her services, to take on the project of trying to restore the garden.

She had some experience in such volunteer landscaping work. As a member of the Edelweiss Club, she is an active participant in the flower garden in the median at Cunningham Lane, the grandfather of the gardens which gaily punctuate our roadsides and medians.

Her first step was to call the Parks and Recreation Department, which referred her to Charles Hood, the "certified rosarian" who has won acclaim for his work. Charles, who handles the landscaping at First National Bank, also oversees the work at the rose garden.

Coincidentally, Charles was looking for help in reviving the garden. The lifelong lover of roses had become discouraged with the solitary struggle he had been enduring in keeping the garden even in "mediocre" shape over the last five years.

Margaret and Charles met at the Red Cross Bloodmobile, a place where it is not uncommon to find Margaret, who admits she is so full of "volunteer spirit, it's overflowing."

Margaret expressed an interest in voluntarily restoring the single memorial bed. Charles — who had received permission from the Parks Department to hire a part-time worker to aid in the entire garden's recovery — offered her that \$3.35 per hour job instead.

"I told him I'd do it, just for the sake of getting this place pretty again," said Margaret, beaming.

The result has been startling. In about a month, the garden has once again become a peaceful, manicured mecca, a place to sit on a stone bench beneath a crabapple tree and gaze at the Mr. Lincolns, the Red Masterpieces and their bright cousins.

"She is something," said Charles. "She gets out there and really works. You should see her with that big tiller." Margaret's dedication to the garden obviously has buoyed the spirits of this hard-working gentleman. He's no longer in the battle alone.

"She's a breath of fresh air," he said.

Margaret points the finger of praise back at her boss. "Maybe when you write about what we are doing, it will waken up some people and they'll get interested in helping," she said, a Rhineland lilt coating her English.

There is more work to be done.

But, what started out as a sadness, an emptiness, because the one bed which holds a special place in a generous heart was overgrown, turned into an obsession to bring the entire garden back to former glory.

The 14 heroes would be proud.

FROM AN ARKANSAS DESCENDANT OF ANANIAS R. TINGLE!

One of the latest contributors to our newsletter is Mrs. Beverly L. Taylor, 85 Orchard Road, Greenbrier, Arkansas 72058. Billie, as she prefers to be called, was born and raised in Georgetown, Delaware, county seat of Sussex County. She writes,

"I grew up no more than 20 or 30 miles from where Hugh Tingle bought his first land in 1693. Samuel Benjamin Tingle (1856-1924), my great grandfather, left the Williamsville area of Delaware and moved some 50-60 miles south, to Willis Wharf, Virginia where my grandfather, Charles Lester Tingle was born in 1885. The latter was an oysterman. The Tingles never seemed to get far from the water back then. I spent all my summers, as a child, on Chincoteague Island, running barefoot, swimming in the shallow Chincoteague Bay, which was less than a hundred feet from the house, clamming and crabbing. I learned to love oysters straight out of the shell when I was about four or five, and clams were ambrosia."

"Chincoteague, in those days, was a quiet little place no one every heard of. Assateague was a barren little island completely cut off from the mainland where the ponies ran wild. Today a bridge joins it to the rest of the country and they've turned it into a state park. The hunters and fishermen discovered Chincoteague and pulled it into the 20th century. So much for one's childhood!"

Billie Taylor is the daughter of Vesta Alice Tingle and her first husband, Albert Henry Bailey. On 30 November 1946 she married Ralph Jackson Taylor. She says, "I traveled all over the country with my husband who was in the military, lived in England for over five years on two tours, and was unaware of my roots until about ten years ago when I got interested in the family beginnings. If I had known of Hugh Tingle and the approximate area he came from, I could have done research while I was in England. I do, however, have two Limeys in the family. Two of my four children were born there. Funny how we somehow go back to our roots, isn't it?"

Billie's maiden name was Beverly Lee Bailey. She has traced her Tingle line back to Ananias Robinson Tingle of Delaware (1797-1872) and his second wife, Mary H. Hudson (1837-1926). The previous issue of the newsletter (Vol. 4 - No. 4 pp. 9-18) listed many Tingle and collateral descendants of this couple. Research is continuing. See last five pages of this issue for her genealogical charts.

Childhood dream of Chincoteague pony swim fulfilled

CHINCOTEAGUE, Va. — Barbara Snyder's daughters may not have appreciated being roused from their beds to tramp through a mosquito-filled marsh at 4 a.m. yesterday, but it fulfilled a "lifelong dream" for their mother.

"I've wanted to do this since I was 5 years old," said Mrs. Snyder, now 35, who drove six hours from Raleigh, N.C., to give the girls, Alrika, 12, and Hannah, 6, corral-side seats to watch the wild ponies make their annual swim from Assateague to Chincoteague Island.

Mrs. Snyder and thousands of other horse lovers streamed into this town of 3,500 residents for the 66th annual pony swim. But the crowd, said officials of the Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Department, which owns and manages the wild pony herd, was much smaller than last year's 30,000 to 40,000.

Many probably were turned off by the early starting time, said Roe Terry, president of the fire company. But that was governed by the tides.

"We have to go with the slack tide, when the current is calmest for the ponies to swim," he explained. "Usually, it's later in the morning."

The first ponies took the plunge at 8:37 a.m. yesterday. Less than five minutes later, they climbed ashore.

About 60 foals from the herd of 160 will be auctioned off tomorrow morning to raise money and to hold down the size of the herd. The remaining horses will be shepherded back across the channel.

Two herds of ponies roam Assateague Island, one on

each side of the Maryland-Virginia border. The Maryland herd, managed by the National Park Service, runs wild and mingles freely with campers and beach-goers. The fire department's herd is kept on the Virginia side with a fence.

A fire company committee, in cooperation with the federal Fish and Wildlife Service, keeps careful check on the herd, bringing in veterinarians for regular medical care and providing hay when hurricanes and winter storms threaten the food supply.

It may be a lot of work for fewer than 30 active members, but it's lucrative.

The fire department won't say how much it earns from the ponies, but a high-ranking officer who didn't want to be identified said the company expects to raise more than \$100,000 from the pony auction and the two-week carnival that coincides with the swim.

Corralled on Chincoteague for a brief rest between the swim and their parade to the carnival grounds, 3-month-old foals shyly nuzzled their mothers' stomachs, breathing heavily and shaking off the channel water. While a few stallions argued and kicked up their heels, most of the horses responded calmly to the pats of the children who crowded the snow fence.

"Here, Michael, here's a spot where you can touch the ponies," said David Saplansky, of Philadelphia, as he edged his 6-year-old son through the crowd to a spot at the fence.

Lifted by his father, the boy tentatively leaned over to pet a damp foal, then pulled his hand back with a giggle. He buried his head in his dad's shoulder and bashfully proclaimed the ponies "nice."

Meanwhile, Mrs. Snyder and her daughters snatched up marsh grass and offered it to the ponies, and Mrs. Snyder talked pony sociology.

"The stallions have collected their mares," she said. "Now all the horses are quiet. Everybody's found each other." With misty eyes, she pressed close to the fence.

"It's hard to separate from them, once you're here," she sighed as the fire department's "saltwater cowboys" began to herd the ponies down
