THE HUNT FOR AUGUSTUS B. TINGLE AND JAMES S. TINGLE

Several Tingle Descendants, among them Mrs. Jody Rice of Orlando, FL, are interested in knowing more about AUGUSTUS B. TINGLE AND JAMES S. TINGLE. Please refer to her article on George Edmund Tingle in Vol. 4 - No. 2, p. 12 of "TINGLE DESCENDANTS."

Augustus B. Tingle was born in Monongalia County, VA about 1800-05 the son of William Tingle (ca 1770-1811). The possibility exists that the initial "B" in his name stood for 'Blair'. One of his sisters was named Susannah Blair Tingle. Those readers who specialize with Tingle research in Kentucky and Indiana might be able to help on this project.

James S. Tingle was a brother of the above Augustus and probably a few years older. The initial 'S' in his name may have been for 'Scott'. A Jas. S. Tingle witnessed the will of George Adam Bush of Harrison County, VA, 15 October 1811. Could any of our readers be a descendant of James S. Tingle? Please help us to identify your ancestor by writing to the editor.

## Gulf war stifles comic inspiration

**W**hat does a comedian do when he has a big gig and is in no mood to be funny?

Jimmy Tingle faced that problem yesterday as he prepped for last night's "Comic Strip Live" taping at Hellenic College.

The Fox broadcast will be hosted by Joe Piscopo, featuring performances by Jimmy Aicek, Blake Clark and Mike Dugan. Music will be provided by rap star Queen Latifah.

Tingle, a onetime Boston-based comedian, has become one of the country's leading topical and political humorists. Now that war has enflamed the Persian Gulf, Tingle is in a quandary.

"I am so far removed from comedy right now," a very solemn Tingle admitted yesterday. "I just don't feel like performing. I'm trying to figure out now what I'm going to do tonight. I'm going to try to be truthful to myself and to the people listening to me."

It would be one thing if Tingle were a generic comic set to talk about trivial, everyday subjects to get people's minds off the horrors in the Middle East. But he's not. Tingle's talent is his ability to get people to look at topical events and ponder their implications in a way that both amuses and challenges.

But Tingle doesn't find anything even remotely amusing about events in the Persian Gulf.

"People are going to get killed," Tingle began, "and the last thing I want to do is to be

perceived as telling jokes about people getting killed. You can comment on policies, but you just can't make light of the situation."

Tingle compared recent events to the day about a month ago when he sat in for comedian Joy Behar, who has a daily radio talk show in New York City.

"I was supposed to be 'Hey! Ho! A comedian! A comic filling in for another comic," Tingle remarked. "But everybody calling in wanted to talk about the Gulf, and I didn't say one comical thing."

Tingle is normally an easy-going conversationalist. But the words came slow and hard yesterday, as though he were trying to organize his thoughts and feelings as he spoke.

"I'm supposed to do eight minutes on the show tonight, and originally it was going to be stuff I intended to do on Letterman or Carson later on," he

continued, "but now this happens in the Gulf."

He admitted he was tempted to ignore recent happenings in the Gulf and just plow into other current events.

"It's pretty weird," he said. "I'm not really in a rah-rah mood about this like the public at large seems to be. I just don't really want to do the show right now, to tell you the truth. I'm gonna alienate a large portion of the audience, no matter what I say. I don't know what the best procedure will be."

"I guess you just read a lot, weigh the pros and cons in your mind, go out and go with what counts."

But Tingle's heart clearly isn't in it. He arrived in Boston Wednesday night and planned to visit a few of the city's comedy clubs to brush up on his original routine.

"I didn't go anywhere. I just stayed in and watched television."

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## CONTRASTS - THE TRAGIC BOAT TRIP

Earlier writings of journalistic prose were full of lavish and flowery language quite unlike that of the present era. In fact, it would appear that today's "reporter" does only just that - report without even a hint of flowing words mastery and sometimes without the use of proper grammar and expression. A no-frills mania seems to have overtaken journalism, and any word pictures now appear mostly in books and magazines. As to an article's accuracy, who knows, always.

To illustrate the point, I quote the original account of the boat trip of July 11, 1838, below as it appeared in the BALTIMORE AMERICAN & COMMERCIAL DAILY ADVERTISER on July 19, 1838.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT - The Worcester Spy, published at Snow-Hill, Maryland, states that a melancholy accident occurred in the Bay, near that place, on the 11th instant. A party of some forty or fifty ladies and gentlemen were on an excursion of pleasure in two boats, when one of them was upset by a sudden flow of wind, and eighteen persons thrown into the water. The other boat picked up twelve of them, but the other six were drowned, viz. Mr. James Hickman and sister, Misses Rachel Hudson, Ann Hudson, Mary H. Hudson and Nancy Bowen. Mr. Hickman, it is said lost his life in endeavoring to save his sister."

Today, by contrast, the "melancholy" accident might be written more or less as follows:

From the WORCESTER SPY, Snow Hill, Maryland, July 11, 1838 - 40 or 50 persons in two sailboats on the Sinepuxent Bay below Hummock Point were overtaken suddenly by a squall which capsized one sailboat, causing 18 of its passengers to fall overboard. Only twelve were rescued by the other boat. One of the rescuers, James Hickman while attempting to save his sister (name unknown) was drowned, as were Rachel Hudson, 34, and Ann E. Hudson, 20 (daughters of Caleb Hudson and his wife, Comfort Massey). Two other victims were Mary Harriet Andasia Tingle Hudson, 11, daughter of Elizabeth Dennis Tingle and her first husband, Thomas Hudson (deceased, July 8, 1832) and Nancy Bowen. Investigation by the U.S. Coast Guard is underway concerning the accident.

The above mentioned Hudson victims are noted in the Tingle-Hudson family Bible by Daniel Caleb Tingle Hudson in the margin of the entry which gives the location of the drownings.

Should any of our readers be able to further identify Nancy Bowen, who might possibly have been a sister of Mary Ann Elizabeth Bowen (1826-1911), the second wife of "Gentleman" John Tingle (1798-1868), please notify your Editor.

Ta Dah! Here's a bone-fide testimonial to the worthiness of our wonderful newsletter with its editor, Seeger Kerns, and staff member Jody (JoAnn) Rice.

Early on, through the newsletter, I began corresponding with Sid Tingle of Lincoln, Nebraska and then with his sister-in-law, Virginia, who is the 'genealogist' of the family.

The 1898 letter from Geo. R. Tingle to Sid's grandfather, Albert H., was printed in the newsletter (Vol. 1 No. 4) and started us thinking there might be a family connection. For Geo. R. Tingle was from my branch.

Virginia had gotten as far back as Dr. Wm. E. Tingle, her husband's great grandfather, born 'around' 1811, and was snagged on the Doctor's tale of being the son of a slave trader who disappeared in Cuba. The Doctor was raised by a black woman. This info was also duly printed in the newsletter, Spring 1990 (Vol. 3 - No. 3).

Yet names kept popping up in Virginia's and other subsequent research that matched mine of William of Morgantown's children. William, who was the older brother of my great, great Grandfather, died in 1811, leaving wife Jane and a passel of children: James S., Delia, Augustus B., George Edmund, Susannah, Mary and William E...too much of a coinkydink to ignore. Especially the last and no doubt youngest, William, born in 18

Jody Rice to the rescue. Seeger had asked Jody to check out George E. Tingle and the rest is really and truly history! for Jody is a never-say-die researcher who won't quit 'till she has it all, documented, verified and xeroxed. Pages and pages of records representing many hours of work gave us the whole story and proved that Doctor Williams's father was indeed William Tingle of Morgantown, a highly respected land owner, and that his mother, Jane, had moved her brood to Kentucky after her husband's death and in 1816 married William McAhron.

So I've found some new cousins, distant in miles and far back in generations, but delightful correspondents I'd like to someday meet. And the Nebraska Tingles have unraveled a lot of knotty questions and discovered their background at last. Consequently I can't say enough for the newsletter. Cheers for it's excellent editor, for Dixie Tingle Willis who takes care of the money and mailing, and for Jody, staff member who should become a professional genealogist but I hope she doesn't because we need her right here.

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WILLIAM TINGLE OF MISSOURI (1811 - )  
and NATHANIEL TINGLE OF MISSOURI (1848 - )

Of the many Christian names followed by the surname, TINGLE, one of the most difficult to research is WILLIAM - especially when no middle name is applied. Take, for instance, WILLIAM TINGLE of Missouri.

The Genealogical Department of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (the Mormon Church) holds a record, titled "The McKee Family" which was compiled by Larry Alan James of Neosho, Missouri in 1983. It embraces genealogy for Gibson, Jackson, Johnson, Lewis, Thomas, McKee and TINGLE related families. The listing discloses that the 1860 census of Jasper County, Missouri for Centre Creek Township, family #842, taken 14 July 1860, shows the following family:

Larry A. James' record showed that WILLIAM TINGLE married SARAH ANN McKEE on 15 January 1846. She died in late 1846 or early 1847, leaving a daughter, SARAH A. E. TINGLE. William Tingle then married her sister ISABELLA, later that year.

Just who was the WILLIAM TINGLE named in the foregoing censuses? It seems likely that he is the same person mentioned in an interesting article written for the JOPLIN GLOBE (Missouri) of 12 Sept. 1991, titled "Pockets of Prosperity." It tells about Jasper County's rich mining history, traced to an old story handed down by pioneers.

"IN the spring of 1849, David Campbell, a miner from Neosho, Missouri, may have found evidence of this legend. While visiting William Tingle at his Turtle Creek farm, Campbell took a walk along the creek. He noticed a number of shallow depressions that appeared to be excavations, abandoned years before.

Campbell thought these depressions might have been mines that had been worked by Spaniards or Indians. Looking for mineral in the depressions, he walked along the banks of the stream and discovered half a dozen chunks of lead. Returning with a spade, Campbell and Tingle dug at the spot and, in half an hour, they gathered more than 100 pounds of pure galena. Tingle immediately went to Springfield to enter the land where the mineral was found."

Doesn't this WILLIAM TINGLE sound like the one mentioned in Larry A. James' research? If he is, then he would have been about 38 years old, having been born around 1811 in Delaware according to the census. He ventured into matrimony only three years earlier. Due to his first wife's early death, leaving him with an infant daughter, he married a second time (to her sister). At the date of the mining discovery in 1849 he had been married only two years.

This recent disclosure about one WILLIAM TINGLE, the miner, is due to Mrs. Retta R. Lindner, P.O. Box 806, Carl Junction, Missouri 64834. She is a descendant of Hugh Tingle of Maryland; through the latter's daughter, Margaret, who married Richard Hudson. Thank you, Mrs. Lindner, for sharing this interesting story with our readers.

Backtracking to the data accumulated by Larry A. James, we find that he also gathered material in 1979 on the JOHNSON FAMILY, of Newton County, Missouri. It shows a MARY ELIZABETH JOHNSON, born 19 Feb. 1852 in Cannon County, Tenn., married to NATHANIEL A. TINGLE, born about 1848. They are buried in Peace Cemetery, Jasper County, Missouri.

It seems obvious that the NATHANIEL TINGLE who married Mary Elizabeth Johnson is a son of WILLIAM TINGLE, born in Delaware about 1811. Now - it would be helpful if some descendants of WILLIAM and NATHANIEL TINGLE will step forward and supply more details about their ancestry. Mrs. Lindner did her part, let's hear from others!

In ending this first chapter of the William/Nathaniel Tingle familie of Missouri, your editor wants to say that he has done research on these same names in Delaware back in the 18th and early 19th centuries, but more remains to be done at the State Archives in Dover, Delaware. The mere fact that the names WILLIAM AND NATHANIEL recur in so many generations leads me to believe that they all stem from a common ancestor, but WHO IS HE, and how do we prove it. Stay tuned !

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EDWARD TINGLE OF HENRY COUNTY, KY (ca 1790-1859)

We are reproducing herein a "Widow's Claim for Pension, War of 1812" for the above named soldier. It was obtained by Mrs. JoAnn (Jody) Rice of Orlando, FL in her on-going quest about TINGLES in Kentucky.

This document is valuable for genealogical research. From it we learn that EDWARD TINGLE served as a private in the Company of Captain Edward George, Gov. Shelby's Division, and was near the Battle of the Thames in Canada. He enlisted 27 August 1813 and was discharged 9 Nov. 1813.

It also shows that he was married to Eleanor Bishop on 8 Dec. 1814 by Isaac Malin in Henry County, KY and that he died in 1859, same county. The declaration reveals that she was 81 years of age when it was filed 27 June 1871, which would indicate she was born about 1790.

Mrs. John Blair Jackson of Columbia, TN supplied a chart in 1987 which disclosed that this EDWARD TINGLE was born in Maryland about 1794, and that he died Sept. 1858 in Henry County, KY. The chart confirmed the fact that he married Eleanor Bishop on 8 Dec. 1814. Mrs. Jackson, whose maiden name was Dorothy M. Tingle, is a great great granddaughter of James Tingle, brother of EDWARD TINGLE.

DECLARATION OF A WIDOW FOR PENSION.

To be executed before Judge or Clerk of Court.

State of Kentucky }  
County of Henry } SS

On this 27th day of June, A. D. eighteen hundred and seventy-one personally appeared before me, Edmund P. Thomas, Clerk, of the County Court, a Court of Record in and for the County and State aforesaid, Eleanor Tingle, aged Eighty one years, a resident of Newcastle County of Henry State of Kentucky, who, being duly sworn according to law, declares that she is the widow of Edward Tingle, who served the full period of sixty days in the (1) military service of the United States in the War of 1812, and who was the identical Edward Tingle who (2) was enrolled in Captain Edward Georges Company, Gov. Shelby's Brigade, Gov. Shelby's Division, at 181, and was honorably discharged at 181 ; that (3) the said Edward Tingle was under

the command of Captain Edward George as a private in the war of 1812, and was near the battle of the Pharus in Canada in the Division commanded by Gov. Shelby. Affiant's recollection is very much at fault, but she does recollect that her husband, said Edward Tingle received a land warrant for his sd services, and that his original discharge certificate is or ought to be on file in the proper office in Washington, and she refers to sd certificate for items in proof;

that she was married under the name of Eleanor Bishop to said Edward Tingle, on the eighth day of December, A. D. 1814, by Isaac Malin, at Henry county, there being no legal barrier to such marriage; that her said husband died at Henry county, on the 1817 day of 1817, and that she has not remarried since his death; that

at no time during the late rebellion against the authority of the United States did she or her said husband adhere to the cause of the enemies of the Government, giving them aid or comfort, or exercised the functions of any office whatever under any authority, or pretended authority, in hostility to the United States; that she will support the Constitution of the United States; that she is not in receipt of a pension under any previous act; that she makes this declaration for the purpose of being placed on the pension rolls of the United States, under the provisions of the act approved February 14, 1871, and hereby constitutes and appoints, with full power of substitution and revocation, J. Allen Porter of Louisville Kentucky

her true and lawful attorney, to prosecute her claim, and obtain the pension certificate that may be issued; that her post office is at Newcastle, County of Henry State of Kentucky; that her domicile or place of abode is Newcastle Henry cty Ky

WHO IS THIS JAMES TINGLE?

David P. Shaw of Reston, Virginia wrote your editor on Sept. 2, 1991 regarding a query he saw in the National Queries Forum a few months ago -

"Would like affiliation of John FOXWORTHY with the Bristol Ironworks in King George County, Virginia (1721-5)? Works established on or about 10 July 1721 with financing by merchants from Bristol, England. Indentured servants utilized to operate works, e.g. Thomas STEELE, William JAYNE, James TINGLE, Thomas OZBAN, Stephen WILLIAMS, Thomas NICHOLAS, James LEGOES, Robert CARR, William JONES, Joshua JESS, James POWELL and Matthew McMAHORNE (VA Mag. Vol. XLII Apr. 1934 #2) signed: Donald F. Foxworthy, 510 Overbrook Road, Baltimore, MD 21212-2101."

The above query brings to mind another made by Mr. Foxworthy which appeared in "TINGLE DESCENDANTS", Vol. 1 - No. 2, P. 7. It read - "British Mercantile Claims - JOHN TINGLE of Prince William Co., VA, 6.18.11 pounds due 1770. Died about ten years ago, insolvent. JAMES TINGLE of Prince William Co., VA 24.5.3 pounds due Sept. 1775. Died about fifteen years ago. Insolvent."

The question is - Could the aforementioned JAMES TINGLE have been the "indentured servant" employed at the Bristol Iron Works many years before and who apparently died about 1760? Can any reader tell us more about this JAMES TINGLE? Did he have a family, i.e. names of wife, children, parents, etc.

★ The pages of our newsletter, from time to time, have disclosed the names of a few Tingles in Virginia during colonial times but progress in identifying them has been almost nil. It is hoped that some of our avid genealogists will dig a little deeper and uncover more clues. After all, Virginia is the oldest colony. It was settled by the English. Chances are some of them were named - TINGLE.★

NUMERBING SYSTEM FOR TINGLE LINES BY GENERATION

So you thought there was only one line of Tingles in North America!

Your editor thought likewise when he started to learn something about the name, TINGLE, back in 1971. At that time he thought all Tingles were descended from HUGH TINGLE who arrived in the colony of Maryland in 1669. With the advent of our family newsletter, it soon became evident that other Tingle lines existed.

Since your editor does not own a computer, he used a simple alpha-numeric system to identify each line of Tingles as it unfolded. The number to the left of the decimal point indicates the generation. It does seem odd that none of these 13 Tingle lines appear to be related (at least in this point of time).

I have over 2,000 names of descendants in 9 of these 13 lines - the largest number being descendants of the Hugh Tingle line of Maryland and the Solomon Tingle line of North Carolina.
