NEW TINGLE DESCENDANTS

LANDIS BLAKE PHILLIPS, b. 21 Sep. 1992, son of Alan R. and Lisa Phillips, 4 Shiloh Farms, Laurel, DE 11956; grandson of J. Paul and Irene Williams Phillips of Salisbury, MD; descendant of ANANIAS R. TINGLE.

There are Tingle descendants living in many areas of the United States and they come to light in strange ways. Take the case of Fred Eakin, presently residing in Porterdale, Newton County, GA. A letter from Mrs. Daisie Freeman Duncan of Lawrenceville, GA to your editor said that Mr. Eakin was seeking the ancestry of his great grandmother, Mary Tingle, daughter of John Tingle, born in Virginia or Ohio.

Thanks to reams of information developed by numerous Tingle descendants, it quickly became evident that Fred's great great grandmother was MARY A. TINGLE, married to JOHN AKIN on 7 April 1825 in Guernsey County, Ohio. Over the years the spelling of the surname slowly changed to Aikin, Akins, Eakin. Through Land Records, wills, marriages and census records it was relatively easy to follow.

Mary Tingle is identified as "Mary A. Tingle, eldest daughter of JOHN TINGLE," in his will (Guernsey Co., Ohio 1826). She was left "a new bureau worth sixteen dollars and four dollars in money with what she has received." Mary A. Tingle Akin (Eakin) died sometime before 28 March 1837. She and her husband were the parents of two children, HIRAM F. EAKIN, b. 24 Jan. 1826 and MARY J. EAKIN, b. 1829, both born in Ohio.

The daughter, MARY J. Eakin, was probably not married. Under that name she filed the death report of her uncle, WILLIAM S. TINGLE, a bachelor, when he died 27 July 1882, age 69, in Monongalia Co. WVA. The 1870 census lists her "keeping house for William S. Tingle." The latter was a brother of her mother. The death notice stated that WILLIAM S. TINGLE was born in Upshur Co., VA and that his parents were JOHN & ELIZ. TINGLE. This interesting piece of information would seem to indicate that this is the same JOHN TINGLE who lived on "the Brushy fork of Fink's Run in the vicinity of the present town of Buckhannon in Upshur County" (from West Virginia Heritage Encyclopedia Supplement Vol 2, pp. 119-120). Identification of the above ELIZABETH TINGLE has eluded researchers, including her birth, marriage and death record. Very likely after her death, her husband, JOHN, remarried a widow named Sarah D. Arnold, b. ca 1790 in Virginia (will - prob, 11 Mar. 1858, Guernsey County, Ohio).

The foregoing bits and pieces help to establish that the above JOHN TINGLE was a brother of WILLIAM TINGLE of Morgantown, Monongalia Co., VA (died at sea in 1811), GEORGE ROBERTS TINGLE (1775-1830) of Morgantown and Cambridge, Guernsey Co., Ohio, and JANE TINGLE DUNLAP of Berkeley Co., VA and Monongalia Co., VA. These four are the children of GEORGE and MARY TINGLE. As readers of our newsletter known, several articles have been published which are gradually revealing the history of this interesting family going back to Revolutionary War days.

Now - getting back to the Eakin family, HIRAM F. EAKIN (1826-1917) was the son of MARY A. TINGLE AKIN (EAKIN). HIRAM was a farmer who married ELIZABETH J. MARTIN (1827-1889) of near Morgantown, VA on 13 April 1854. They had seven children, one of whom was FESTUS EAKIN, b. 4 Jan. 1867 near Morgantown, (now W.VA.). FESTUS, who died 23 March 1904 in Fairmont, W.VA married MARTHA H. LARKIN of Monongalia Co. W.VA and had two children, one of whom was FRANK A. EAKIN.

FRANK A. EAKIN was born 25 June 1894 in Monongalia County, W.VA, and married Margeret **Herrberg** on 14 Feb. 1916 at Huntington, Indiana. FRANK, who died 12 June 1921 not quite 27 years of age, and Margaret had two sons, FRANK THOMAS EAKIN, b. 11 Dec. 1916 at Kokomo, Indiana and FRED EAKIN, B. 13 Mar. 1919 at Huntington, IN.

FRANK THOMAS EAKIN, who died 31 Oct. 1974 at Schenectady, N.Y., was married 9 Sep. 1939 and had two children, LINDA HALL EAKIN, b. 11 Sep. 1942 at Fort Wayne, IN. and DAVID EAKIN.

LINDA HALL EAKIN married 27 July 1964 to ROBERT FRANK RAKOWSKI b. 8 Oct. 1941 in Rahway, N.J. They are the parents of three daughters EMILY DANA, b. 4 Nov. 1966 JENNIFER LISA, b. 12 Mar. 1970 and CARD ELIZABETH, b. 23 Dec. 1974. Mr. Rakowski was a captain in the U.S. Air Force, serving from 1964 to 1968. Presently, he is a professor of physiology at the University of Health Sciences/the Chicago Medical School in North Chicago, IL.

MRS. RAKOWSKI, a niece of MR. FRED EAKIN, supplied meticulous charts and wrote that "my genealogical efforts will be aimed at documenting my ancestors" participation in all aspects of the American experience whether war, migration or depression. I, with your help can share the past with my children and grandchildren-to-be. What richer gift is there?!" How true!!!

As noted above, FRED EAKIN was born in 1919 in Huntington, IN. He was married at Fort Wayne, in 1948. Six children resulted from this marriage, three of whom died as infants. Fred, who was employed at the U.S. Rubber Co., is now retired and living in Porterdale, GA. He is, therefore, living in TINGLE country except that the Tingles in this area of Georgia are descendants of Solomon Tingle of Craven County, North Carolina whose son, JOHN TINGLE, migrated to Georgia back in the early 1800's.

Nevertheless, it seems that most TINGLE descendants want to know something about other TINGLE descendants, and so FRED EAKIN went 'hunting' one day. His curiosity was aroused by an interesting article which appeared in our newsletter, Vol. 5 - No. 3. pp. 13-18. Written by our loyal staff member, Mrs. Joan K. Tingle of Valley Center, CA, it described the old homeplace of the ARCHIE TINGLE family on TINGLE Road in the Blount Community of Monroe County, Georgia, Fred found it, but only with the help of Mrs. Daisie Freeman Duncan's 92 year old cousin. The old TINGLE road has been closed by the county or state and the present dirt TINGLE road off SR 142 is about 1/4 mile away. Eventually, FRED located the foundation and chimneys of the old homestead, now reclaimed by forest and woodlands as aptly described by JOAN TINGLE, when she visited the site a few years ago.

It is rewarding to the staff of the newsletter to see the continuing interest of TINGLE descendants in the many phases of the lives of other TINGLE descendants.

## OBITUARIES

Deborah Coady Kormuth, 65,  
courageous friend of needyBy Rafael Alvarez

Deborah Coady Kormuth was fearless.

Whether as a teen-ager soaring over a 10-foot fence on the back of a surging horse or arguing before hard-nosed judges on behalf of wayward juveniles, Debbie Kormuth lived her 65 years with courage, her friends said.

Mrs. Kormuth, a champion show rider in her youth who turned to social work after college, died of cancer Sunday at her home on Big Falls Road in White Hall.

"I didn't want to be a social worker when I went in to interview with her after college. I was just practicing for job interviews," said Susan Barnes, a former colleague in the Baltimore County office of the Juvenile Services Administration. "I came home and told my parents: 'I want this job!'"

"She was the hardest worker I ever saw . . . she could relate to families rich or poor with dignity," Ms. Barnes said. "She always did what was right whether it was what people liked or not. My life changed because of her."

Born Deborah Coady in Baltimore to attorney Charles Pearce Coady and the still-life artist Emma Louise Coady, she graduated from what is now the Notre Dame Preparatory School before earning a degree in psychology in 1948.

In the 1940s she became a well-known rider of hunters and jumpers at Maryland horse shows.

"She loved the sport and did it on her own, her parents didn't participate," said Kathleen Beers, a lifelong friend who said that as children she and Mrs. Kormuth sometimes shared a playpen when their mothers socialized. "Debbie was independent, plucky and exceptionally

good. She would school and exercise other people's horses and when they saw how well she rode they'd ask her to ride their horse in a show."

But a few years after leaving Goucher College, in 1952, Mrs. Kormuth began working as a child-welfare case worker in what is now the Baltimore County Department of Social Services.

In 1966 she moved to the Juvenile Services Administration, first as a probation counselor and then as an intake counselor.

"She was fearless to the point of being reckless, she did not care where the chips fell," said Genevieve Parlett, a longtime colleague.

"Never once did she look down her nose. If anybody needed help, it didn't matter who they were — Debbie always made them feel like our best client."

At her retirement party in 1983 — an event attended by nearly every judge in Baltimore County — she was commended by the governor and the Baltimore County executive.

Mrs. Kormuth was also active in the Baltimore County Youth Commission, the Children's Council, the Interagency Committee on Child Abuse and Neglect and the Coordinating Council for Youth Development.

She also became interested in conservation, as a member of the Wilderness Society, the Nature Conservancy, the Audubon Society, the Sierra Club and the Chesapeake Bay Foundation.

At the time of her death, she had been breeding and training horses at her Bountiful Farm stable for about 10 years.

Married twice, Mrs. Kormuth is survived by a friend, George Bass of White Hall; two brothers, John T. Coady of St. Michaels and Charles Pearce Coady Jr. of Accomac, Va.; a son, David Beaudouin of Baltimore; and a grandson.

Private services were planned but the family suggested memorial contributions could be made to the First Step Youth Services Center in Randallstown or to the House of Ruth.

Deborah Coady Kormuth, a TINGLE descendant, died on 26 July 1992 of cancer. She was the daughter of the late Emma Louise Tingle and her husband, the late Charles Pearce Coady. She was an eighth generation descendant of HUGH TINGLE who came to Maryland in 1669. The staff of the newsletter expresses its sympathy to her family.

LOUISA TINGLE LISTER (ca 1804-1878)  
OF MARYLAND AND MISSOURI

In 1837 John Tingle, his wife Sarah (Sally) Messick Tingle, and their large family left Worcester County, Maryland for the fertile fields of Shelby County, Missouri.

At about the same time or a few years earlier, three brothers - John T. Lister, Coard H. Lister and William Lister - came to Missouri from the same county in Maryland. They were among the early settlers of the Harris settlement in Macon County. With their wives they were among the original members of Bethlehem Church in Anabel, founded in 1842 in that county. John and Coard Lister put up a blacksmith shop in Round Grove Township, Macon County, thereby following in the footsteps of their grandfather, William Lister, who had been a blacksmith in Worcester County, Maryland.

Before leaving his roots in the East, John T. Lister had obtained a License in Worcester County on 4 Oct. 1830 to marry Laurretta S. Truitt. She accompanied him to Macon County. She used the name 'Louisa', so it is possible that the transcriber misspelled the name originally. Also, the date may have been 7 Oct. 1829.

John T. and Louisa Lister had three children; Charles Daniel Lister, b. 15 July 1830; Francis George Lister, b. 20 Oct. 1833 and Peter A. Lister, b. 9 Jan. 1837. Louisa Lister died 11 Jan. 1837, possibly as a result of childbirth.

Left with three small sons to raise, John T. Lister married a second time (30 August or 30 Oct. 1837) to - LOUISA TINGLE, daughter of the John and Sarah Messick Tingle mentioned in the first paragraph. They had the following children:

The seven children named above are, therefore, TINGLE descendants through their mother LOUISA TINGLE LISTER. They are half-brothers and half sisters to the three sons of Louisa Truitt Lister.

A long time reader of our family newsletter is Mrs. Dallas M. Morrison of Conewango Valley, New York. She had recently furnished us with a list of 115 TINGLE descendants resulting from the marriage of Louisa Tingle to John T. Lister. Some of the collateral names included are:

Mrs. Morrison said that much of the information acquired came from a book by Howard A. Thompson (brother to her great grandmother) and that 18 family members worked on assembling the data.

Mrs. and Mrs. Morrison are the parents of four sons and a daughter. They also have eight grandchildren. Through her efforts, the many individuals contained in her charts can now be linked in direct descent through nine generations to HUGH TINGLE and his wife, ELIZABETH POWELL. Hugh Tingle arrived in the Maryland province in 1669. Mrs. Morrison's grandchildren are the eleventh generation in that line.

We are appreciative of the great effort made by her in producing this family information for all TINGLE descendants and we thank her for supplying the photograph below of her great grandmother, Susan Mary Thompson Lister (1854-1945) with her six children. It was probably taken about 1895, some three years after the death of Susan's husband, John T. M. Lister (a.k.a. Henry Mackey Lister)

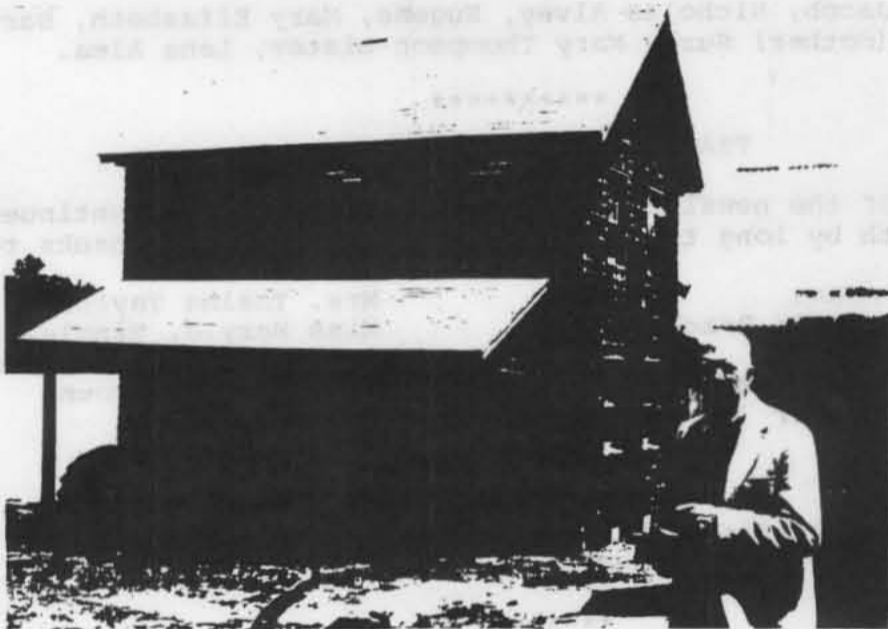
THE BIBLE OF ANANIAS R. TINGLE (1797-1872)  
SUSSEX COUNTY, DELAWARE

Among the many fine resources available for genealogical research in the Delaware State Archives of Dover is a splendid collection of Bible records assembled by members of the Delaware Chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution over a period of thirty-one years, 1943 to 1974.

Certainly one such treasure is the Family Record taken from the Bible of ANANIAS R. TINGLE and his wife. ELIZABETH R. DERICKSON. However, the record in the Archives was a black and white photocopy and difficult to read. Copies sent by the Archives upon appropriate request were often blurred and resulted in errors of spelling, initials and dates.

Recently it was the good fortune of your editor to make the acquaintance of Mrs. Dorothy Williams Pepper of Selbyville and Fenwick Island, Delaware who said she knew the present owner of the Bible. This turned out to be Mrs. Irene Williams Phillips of Salisbury, Maryland a 3x Great Granddaughter of ANANIAS R. TINGLE through his eldest child, SARAH JANE TINGLE, born 15 Jan. 1821, SARAH JANE married EDWARD WILLIAMS McCABE, 18 Dec. 1849.

Mrs. Phillips, her aunt, Mrs. Clara Williams Trimble, and your editor went hunting for graves and old houses one day last May. We found the JOHNSON/TINGLE family grave yard at Johnson's Corner and the original home farm of CHARLES C. TINGLE (1839-1915), youngest child of ANANIAS and his first wife. It is pictured here just off old County Road 384 near Johnson's Corner in Sussex Co. The old house now unused sat on a small hill only several feet from its present location. Your editor was at the 'ready!'

With regard to the bible, Mrs. Phillips has graciously consented for its contents to be used in our family newsletter. She has inspected each entry meticulously and says that the wording stated herein is in exact conformity with the Bible. In numerous other records the spelling of the 'ANANIAS' is often listed as "ANNANIAS". We have chosen to use it with one 'N', as that is the way it is recorded in the Bible.

ANANIAS R. TINGLE was quite a man! He was born 13 March 1797 in lower Sussex County, Delaware, the son of WILLIAM TINGLE and his wife, ELIZABETH R. DERICKSON. She was the daughter of GEORGE DERICKSON.<sup>1</sup> WILLIAM TINGLE the father, died while his son was still a minor, and THOMAS EVANS was appointed guardian.<sup>2</sup>

Ananias I. Tingle son of Ananias R. Tingle and Elizabeth his wife departed this life November 16th 1840 aged 8 years 11 months and 4 days.

Alfred D. Tingle son of Ananias R. Tingle and Elizabeth his wife departed this life January 30th 1841 Aged 6 years 4 months 10 days.

William H. Tingle son of Ananias R. Tingle and Elizabeth his wife departed this life December 3, 1846 on Thursday. Aged 22 years 7 months and 17 days.

Edward W. McCabe the son of Mathew and Eliza McCabe departed this life November 23rd 1883. Age 58 years 9 months 17 days.

Elizabeth R. Tingle wife of Ananias R. Tingle departed this life April the 4th day 1853. Aged fifty years eleven months and twenty-one days.

Levin D. Tingle son of Ananias R. Tingle and Elizabeth his wife departed this life March 11th A.D. 1863. Aged 33 years 1 month and nine days.

Ananias R. Tingle son of William and Elizabeth his wife departed this life March 19th, 1872. Aged 75 years and 6 months.

On 10 Feb. 1820 ANANIAS R. TINGLE married ELIZABETH R. DERICKSON, the daughter of HANDY AND SARAH DERICKSON. It is interesting to note that the father WILLIAM and his son ANANIAS R., each married a girl named ELIZABETH R. DERICKSON,. Nine children were born to this marriage in the following order:

ANANIAS R. TINGLE and his first wife, ELIZABETH R. DERICKSON, had been married 33 years when she died 4 April 1853. Five of their nine children predeceased her in death.

On 30 August 1854, ANANIAS R. TINGLE, at age 57 married a second time to MARY H. HUDSON, b. 1832 and who died in 1926. Six children were born to this marriage, viz:

The births of the last two children, ANANIAS ROBERSON TINGLE, JR. and LOVIMAL E. H. TINGLE are not recorded in the bible.

ANANIAS R. TINGLE died 19 March 1872 age 75 years and 6 months, the father of fifteen children, the last born when he was almost 73.<sup>10</sup> Yes, he was quite a man!

There seems little doubt that ANANIAS R. TINGLE was named by his father, WILLIAM TINGLE, in honor of ANNANIAS ROBERSON<sup>3</sup>. These ROBERSONS and TINGLES appear to have been related. Using terminology in various wills, administration accounts, guardian petitions and land transactions discloses a pattern of relationship as follows:

On 6 Oct. 1706 WILLIAM ROBINSON patented a tract of 150 acres called ROBINSON'S PURCHASE<sup>4</sup> on the 'seaboard side' on Assawoman Bay, Ten years later he willed it to his sons MICHAEL ROBINSON and JOSHUA ROBINSON. It must be remembered that in those days the land was in Somerset County, MD. In 1742 that portion of Somerset was partitioned into Worcester Co., MD.



In a series of transactions dated 5 Nov. 1738, MICHAEL ROBINSON and wife, PARTHENIA, sold to and bought from his brother, JOSHUA and wife Priscilla certain portions of this land described as ASSAWOMAN, ROBINSON'S LUCK and ROBINSON'S PURCHASE.<sup>5</sup>

When MICHAEL ROBINSON<sup>6</sup> made his will 27 October 1763 bequests were made "to my sons WILLIAM, MICHAEL, my daughter PUTHEANY TINGLE land I own called 'ROBINSON'S PURCHASE!', and to daughter RACHEL ROBINSON, 50 acres. Executors: wife JOYCE and son WILLIAM, The Will was received for probate on 7 March 1754.

The land transaction for ROBINSON'S PURCHASE back on 5 Nov. 1738 indicated that MICHAEL ROBINSON'S wife's name was Parthenia, yet his will of 27 Oct. 1753 names his wife JOYCE as executor along with his son, WILLIAM. It would appear that PARTHENIA had died and MICHAEL had remarried JOYCE. And one of the three witnesses to this will was WILLIAM TINGLE. This will is the first evidence that a ROBINSON had married a TINGLE, but what TINGLE is it?

In each year from 1758 to 1762 the Land Office Proprietary Debt Books of Maryland for Worcester County show 50 acres of a tract called ROBINSON'S PURCHASE in the name of ISRAEL TINGLE.<sup>7</sup> This is the only source for his name appearing in any Maryland record.

The next recorded evidence for a connection between the names of ROBINSON and TINGLE comes to light in the Delaware State Archives. It is the will of ANNANIAS ROBINSON<sup>3</sup> made 24 May 1787 and received for probate five days later, 29 May 1787. It divulges all kinds of family history, Consider the following:

"Bequests were made to my mother-in-law MARY ROBERSON, 50 acres during her life, land and mill; at her death to WILLIAM TINGLE, his heirs forever."

Also a "bequest to WILLIAM TINGLE son of ISRAEL TINGLE, 25 acres of land lying on the east side of the branch that my mill is on."

- \* Also, "give to LEAH TINGLE daughter of ISREAL TINGLE, my bay mare"
- "Give to LEAH WALTER one shilling"
- "Give to ELIZABETH TUBB one shilling,"
- "Give to WILLIAM ROBERSON'S heirs and MICHAEL ROBERSON'S heirs, sons of WILLIAM ROBERSON my uncle, two shillings",
- "Give to WILLIAM TINGLE son of ISRAEL TINGLE, my horse and saddle,"
- "Give to my Aunt Prethy TINGLE, personalty, etc."
- "Give Rhoda TINGLE 15 pounds
- "Give NANCY TINGLE 6 pewter plates."

Executor: WILLIAM TINGLE (whole and soul)

A careful interpretation of the wording in ANNANIAS ROBERSON'S will would seem to say that:

1. ANNANIAS ROBERSON was a son of MICHAEL ROBINSON (Will made 27 Oct. 1753) who though not named in the will was undoubtedly given his inheritance prior to his father's death.

- \* Also, "Give to LUKE TINGLE, son of ISRAEL TINGLE, all remaining part of my land after my mother-in-law's 50 acres on west side of Mill Road".

2. ANNANIAS ROBERSON was probably a BACHELOR.
3. MICHAEL ROBINSON'S first wife, PARTHENIA (surname unknown) died some time after 5 Nov. 1738. He apparently remarried JOYCE (surname unknown) as she was named executrix in his will along with son WILLIAM.
4. MICHAEL ROBINSON'S DAUGHTER, PUTHEANY TINGLE must certainly seem to be named for her mother, PARTHENIA. Since her married name of TINGLE is used in her father's will of 27 Oct. 1783, she was probably born about 1735.
5. ANNANIAS ROBERSON was undoubtedly looking after his aunt PRETHENY TINGLE'S children and certainly provided for them in his will. They would appear to be his first cousins.
6. One troublesome term in the will of ANNANIAS ROBERSON is his bequest "to my mother-in-law, MARY ROBERSON, 50 acres during her life, land and mill; at her death to WILLIAM TINGLE, his heirs forever." This appears to be the same tract described in the will of PARTHENY TINGLE<sup>8</sup> made 3 October 1791 and received for probate on 13 Nov. 1799. This researcher is at a loss to determine the exact relationship of ANNANIAS ROBERSON'S mother-in-law MARY ROBERSON when matched against his father (MICHAEL)'s two wives, PARTHENIA and JOYCE unless JOYCE and MARY are one and the same person.

Just to be sure, ANNANIAS ROBERSON'S will positively identifies the following children of ISRAEL TINGLE:

William Tingle  
 Luke Tingle  
 Leah Tingle  
 Rhoda Tingle  
 Nancy Tingle

Who was ISRAEL TINGLE? That he was the husband of PRETHENY (PARTHENIA) ROBERSON seems most likely. But other than the will of ANNANIAS ROBERSON in Sussex County, DE and the 1728-1762 land Office Debt Books of Worcester County, MD, the name of ISRAEL TINGLE has not shown up in a single record. If we presume that he was about the same age (or a trifle older than PARTHENIA (PRETHENY) ROBINSON TINGLE) he would have been born about 1730-35. Who were his parents?

Could he have been a grandson of HUGH TINGLE, the progenitor? If so, the most likely candidate for his father would seem to be HUGH TINGLE II. The grandsons of the other three male children of the progenitor (SAMUEL, JOHN and DANIEL) have been fairly well documented in the pages of our newsletter. HUGH TINGLE II, as our readers know, left his Maryland Delaware roots and settled in Eastern North Carolina in the 1750's. One of his sons, JOSEPH TINGLE, also went to that same area either with his father or at about the same time. JOSEPH had nine children one of whom was named ISRAEL. The latter was married on 4 April 1780 to MARTHA TINGLE, in Beaufort/Craven County N.C. It is doubtful that he is the same ISRAEL who was in Delaware. Reading the will of PARTHENIA ROBINSON TINGLE will help to explain why.

She made her will 8 Oct. 1791 and it was received for probate 13 Nov. 1799 in Sussex County, DE<sup>8</sup> Her age at death would probably be about 65. The will specified that "my whole estate be equally divided between my eight children namely:

WILLIAM TINGLE  
CALIB (sic) TINGLE  
LUKE TINGLE  
NANCY TINGLE  
COMFORT EVENS  
ELIZABETH ROGERS  
RHODA BEACHEM (a.k.a. Beauchamp)  
grandsons JOHN, EDWARD and ISAAH CLARK  
(Children of her deceased daughter TABITHA CLARK)

The will stipulated that WILLIAM TINGLE should take his brother, CALIB and all his estate without interest until he shall be of age one and twenty. This clause indicates that Calib was born between 1770 and 1791. If Parthenia, his mother, was born about 1735 then Calib was probably born about 1775. So ISRAEL was in Delaware at that time. Yet, there is no record of his death.

PARTHENIA ROBINSON TINGLE's will stipulated a bequest to my two sons, WILLIAM TINGLE and CALIB (sic) TINGLE, all my right title and claim unto a certain tract of parcel of land called ROBINSON PURCHES (sic) whereon I now live. This is the same land devised to her by her father, MICHAEL ROBINSON, in his will of 27 October 1753. And it is the same land inherited by her grandson, ANNANIAS R. TINGLE upon the death of the latter's father WILLIAM TINGLE in April 1799. It certainly appears thst ANNANIAS ROBENSON, a nephew to PARTHENIA ROBINSON TINGLE felt a responsibility to her children. Therefore it would be only natural for PARTHENIA'S oldest son WILLIAM TINGLE to honor his only son with the name ANNANIAS ROBINSON TINGLE when the child was born 13 March 1797<sup>9</sup>.

ANNANIAS ROBINSON TINGLE had an older sister SOPHIA. It is not certain how much older she was than ANANIAS but probably five or six years. Her aunt TABITHA CLARK, (sister to her father, WILLIAM) had died and left three sons. SOPHIA was still a minor in August 1809 when her mother, ELIZABETH (DERICKSON) TINGLE filed a guardian Account. It showed payments to JOHN CLARK(E) for rent. This could well have been the final Guardian Account filed for her by her mother as she may have reached legal age in August 1809<sup>11</sup>. At that time her brother ANANIAS, would have been age 12.

That SOPHIA and her brother, ANANIAS, lost their father at a young age is no doubt. Their mother, ELIZABETH, as administratrix for the estate of her husband, WILLIAM, filed an account with the court on 10 August 1801, showing that he left two heirs, SOPHIA and ANANIAS ROBINSON TINGLE.<sup>12</sup> The estate was worth 63 pounds, 8 shillings, 6 pence, of which the widow was entitled to one-third. On 19 April 1808 THOMAS EVANS was appointed Guardian for ANANIAS R. TINGLE. The latter petitioned the Orphan's Court to appoint five freeholders "to go upon and view the lands and tenements and lay off the widow's dower." On 15 July 1809 the report was made and distribution approved, as follows:

To the widow, ELIZABETH TINGLE, 31 acres and 151 poles  
To daughter, SOPHIA, now the wife of JOHN CLARKE,  
34 acres and 6 poles;  
To son, ANANIAS, 45 acres and 15 poles.

While it has taken almost five years to assemble the material for this story, your editor feels that more information lies hidden in family bibles, letters, journals etc. Take the case of Mrs. Crane in the previous paragraph. Among her ancestors were NATHANIEL ELLIS and Sally Rogers of Sussex Co., DE Through an old ELLIS bible it developed that Sally Rogers (b. 30 June 1802) was the daughter of ELIZABETH and \_\_\_\_\_ Rogers of Sussex Co. and that ELIZABETH was one of the eight children named in the will of PARTHENA ROBINSON TINGLE<sup>8</sup> who died in 1799. Let's hope that other TINGLE descendants will try to untrack old family bibles that can throw new light on PARTHENA ROBINSON TINGLE's married daughters, viz; COMFORT EVANS, RHODA BEAUCHEM (BEAUCHAMP), and TABITHA CLARK.

Also, take the example of a Journal. CHARLES LESTER TINGLE (1885 - 1970), son of SAMUEL BENJAMIN TINGLE (1855-1924) and grandson of ANANIAS ROBINSON TINGLE (1797-1872) kept a meticulous journal of his life spanning the years 1897 to 1944. Here was a God-fearing man with little schooling but who grew from boyhood to manhood with many fine attributes. In his limited way he recorded his life in Journal form. If nothing else it helps us to focus on how lucky we are today, despite all the bad news in the daily press. Charles Lester Tingle left an invaluable source of family names, places and events. I am especially grateful to his granddaughter, MRS. BEVERLY (BILLIE) TAYLOR of Greenbrier, Arkansas for having made this 67 page Journal available to your editor.

At this writing 176 descendants of ISRAEL AND PARTHENIA ROBINSON TINGLE have been identified in ten generations. While the editor of this newsletter does not fall into this particular line of TINGLE descent he finds this line one of the most interesting of those unfolded since he started on our voyage of TINGLE discovery and he hopes that some of the many living descendants will pursue the quest for more knowledge of this interesting TINGLE Line.
