Her parents are Carolyn Tingle of Kearney and Tom Tingle of Grand Island, Nebraska.

FIRST TIME FOR A TINGLE (continued from page 1)--

Melissa's grandparents are Virginia and Robert Edwin Tingle of Kearney. Long-time readers of our newsletter may recall that Virginia, who is the historian for the Tingles of Nebraska, uncovered the fact that her husband was a direct descendant of Dr. William E. Tingle, born in or near Morgantown, Virginia (now West Virginia) on 6 April 1811.

Working with Mrs. Dolli Tingle Brackett of Westport, Conn., Virginia found that they were descended from the same TINGLE line. The above Dr. Tingle was a son of WILLIAM and JANE TINGLE and this William was a brother of GEORGE ROBERT(S) TINGLE, ancestor of Dolli.

William and George Robert(s) Tingle were two of the four children of GEORGE and MARY TINGLE. Considerable research by Dolli and your editor developed the fact that this GEORGE TINGLE served in the Revolutionary War as a rifleman from Shepherdstown, Virginia who lost his life in or immediately after the battle at Fort Washington, New York, in November 1776.

Since its beginning in 1890 at Washington, D.C., the D.A.R. has maintained a PATRIOT INDEX of those who served with unflinching loyalty in the cause of American Independence during the Revolutionary War.

No TINGLE has ever appeared on this PATRIOT INDEX.

The name of GEORGE TINGLE from Virginia is now listed on the PATRIOT INDEX. Melissa Jane Tingle is a direct descendant of this George in the eighth generation, detailed as follows:

son of ALBERT HOLIDAY TINGLE, b. 12 Dec. 1853, Winterset, Iowa
son of WILLIAM E. TINGLE, M.D., b. 6 Apr. 1811, Morgantown, Virginia.
son of WILLIAM TINGLE, b. ca 1772, near Martinsburg, Virginia.
son of GEORGE TINGLE, b. ca 1746, probably in Virginia.

It is worth noting that Melissa Jane Tingle has become a member of the D.A.R. by being able to trace her direct ancestry through seven generations of the male TINGLE line. That's highly unusual.

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As a result of this breakthrough it is now possible for any woman, who can trace her line of descent from GEORGE TINGLE of Virginia, to become a member of the D.A.R. provided she is invited by a Chapter and meets the necessary requirements. Some 238 descendants of GEORGE TINGLE have been identified through nine generations. Even after years of research by Dolli Tingle Brackett and your editor, we have been unable to identify the father and mother of GEORGE TINGLE. So--we cannot go back beyond 1746-- at least at this 'stage of our search'.

Among our readers, the following are descendants of GEORGE TINGLE of Virginia: Mrs. Richard D. Barnes, Mrs. Brackett, Fred Eakin, Mrs. E. Throop Geer, Mrs. Linda H. Rakowski, Lewis M. Tingle, Robert Edwin Tingle, Sidney A. Tingle, Mrs. Mildred E. Warden.

We offer our congratulations to MELISSA JANE TINGLE. As she goes through life she can share a little bit of satisfaction in knowing that her 5 X great grandfather has been given the recognition so long undiscovered. In conclusion, we thank Mrs. Virginia E. Tingle, Mrs. Dolli Tingle Brackett, Mrs. JoAnn R. Rice, Mrs. Belva Geist, Head Genealogist, and Mrs. Ann W. Wellhouse, former Assistant Head Genealogist of the National Society of the D.A.R. for their indispensable aid in developing the required information to place GEORGE TINGLE'S name on the PATRIOT INDEX, an honor he has long deserved.

ARAPAHOE — James "Cotton" Tingle, 65, of Cambridge, Mass., died Saturday at Mount Auburn Hospital in Cambridge.

A graveside service is set for 3 p.m. Wednesday at the Tingle Family Cemetery in Arapahoe with the Rev. Merritt Watson officiating.

He was a veteran of World War II and the Korean War. He attended Northeastern University in Boston, Mass., and was the former owner of Newton Yellow Cab in Massachusetts.

He is survived by his widow Frances DeGuglielmo; sons James Tingle Jr., Garrett Tingle and Robert Tingle, all of Cambridge; daughter Ruth Growley of Cambridge; brothers Jack Tingle of San Diego, Calif., and Ted Tingle of Garland; sisters Evelyn DeGuglielmo of Cambridge and Pauline Waters, Dixie Willis and Francis Cayton, all of New Bern; and three grandchildren.

QUICK IDENTIFICATION!

In our previous issue (Vol. 6 - No. 3 - p. 10) we included a short article about a birthday party in 1924 for one EDWARD TINGLE, supposedly of Boston, Mass., and asked if any reader could identify him.

Promptly a card arrived at the home of Mrs. JoAnn R. Rice in Orlando, FL from Ms. Elaine Mitchell of Lakewood, Ohio. The latter pointed out that the party did not take place in Boston, Massachusetts but in Boston, Indiana, a small town located in Wayne County, Indiana, a few miles west of the Ohio/Indiana state line.

As for the identification of the above EDWARD TINGLE, Jody Rice thinks he may be part of the JOHN W. TINGLE and MARY L. EARLY-TINGLE line of Richmond, Wayne Co., Indiana and Eaton, Preble Co., Ohio. JOHN W. TINGLE was the son of SAMUEL LOCKWOOD TINGLE and grandson of JAMES TINGLE, the latter born in Delaware about 1764. Between Jody and Elaine, two expert genealogists, it won't be long before EDWARD TINGLE of Boston, Indiana is positively identified.

FROM MARYLAND TO KENTUCKY - JASPER TINGLE (ca 1765-ca 1840)

Your editor is very pleased to include in this issue a detailed and documented article from Mrs. JoAnn R. Rice of Orlando, FL about JASPER TINGLE of Maryland. Mrs. Rice, a native of Indiana whose roots go back to Kentucky, has spent untold hours in unraveling the mysteries that have shrouded the lives of many TINGLES. Many of our readers are descendants of the Kentucky TINGLES and they can thank Mrs. Rice for her relentless pursuit of more knowledge about the early TINGLES in that state. As search continues, the possibility expands that some of the earliest Kentucky TINGLES are descendants of HUGH TINGLE who came to Maryland in 1669. But that statement remains to be proved.

The earliest Maryland TINGLES lived on the Eastern Shore of Maryland which is part of the Delmarva Peninsula. In 1769 the long standing dispute about the boundary between Maryland and Delaware was finally settled. One result was that many Maryland residents found themselves living in Delaware. Quite a few owned land that straddled the state line. Some TINGLES found themselves in this position.

As Elaine Hastings Mason, who researched the Land Records of Sussex County, Delaware 1782-1789 (Deed Book N - No. 13), stated, "Many new Sussex County inhabitants simply stopped recording their legal papers. During the chaos of the Revolution, few records were filed by anyone".

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FROM MARYLAND TO KENTUCKY - JASPER TINGLE (continued from page 7)--

While the name of JASPER TINGLE appears on the "RECONSTRUCTED" 1790 CENSUS OF DELAWARE, later census records in Kentucky indicated his place of birth as Maryland. As shown in Mrs. Rice's article, he was a witness to the will of one Tamer Hitchens in Sussex County, Delaware in 1791, so it would seem that he was one of those TINGLES born in the disputed section of Maryland who later unavoidably became a resident of Delaware, and then left for greener pastures in Kentucky.

So far, it has not been possible to determine the parents of JASPER TINGLE. But the search will continue in the hope that some clue will surface to solve this mystery.

Mrs. Rice's article also sent a map and some pictures of the earliest Kentucky log houses which unfortunately, we are unable to include because of lack of space. Thank you, Jody, for the great amount of time you spent in preparing this article.

JASPER TINGLE (ca 1765 - ca 1840) - - please read pp. 9 to 18.

A "Re-constructed 1790 Census, of Delaware", [1] is the oldest record of JASPER TINGLE, that I have discovered. The following list of Tingles, (Males of age 16 or over), were listed as being residents of Baltimore Hundred, in Sussex County, Delaware:

JAMES TINGLE	LITTLETON TINGLE
* JASPER TINGLE	LUKE TINGLE
JOHN TINGLE	WILLIAM TINGLE
THOMAS TINGLE	

About a year later, on Feb. 15, 1791, JASPER TINGLE was a witness to the Will of TAMER HITCHENS, of Sussex County, DE. The heirs of that Will, were: sons ISAAC HITCHENS, and EDWARD HITCHENS; daughters: POLLY, SALLY, REBECCA, VINA & UMY(?)HITCHENS. Executor was THOMAS HAZZARD. Witnesses: JOSEPH DIRICKSON, BENJ. LONG, and JASPER TINGLE.....Each of the heirs were to receive one shilling ;.....with the exception of POLLY. She was bequeathed, "all the residue & remainder of my worldly estate", to her and her heirs and assigns (assigns), forever. [28 & 38]

The above document, may be the only clue, to the identity of Jasper's wife. The only thing known about her, so far, is her approximate age and birth year; 1766 to 1784, as per the 1810 census of Kentucky; [10] the 1820 census shows her as over 45 years of age; [11] plus the 1830 census of Woodford County, KY., listed both of them as 65 years, or older. She was probably born circa 1766. [18]

Returning to the possible clue to Jasper's wife (), in the above mentioned Will; I think it is quite possible, that POLLY HITCHENS was married to JASPER TINGLE, circa 1785 to 1790. They later named one of their daughters, POLLY TINGLE..... Many of the old documents were witnessed by family members, in-laws, & neighbors. The absence of Delaware records; unfortunately, leaves many marriages, names and other vital dates, "In-Limbo", until someone finds a family bible or diary, etc.[20 &28]

JASPER TINGLE, b. 1764-65, Maryland.....page 2.

Just as the 1790 census, above, tells us that there were seven, Tingle, males, of age 16 or above, living in Sussex County, DE.; so, does the 1800 census of the same area, tell us that some of them were missing. JASPER TINGLE, JOHN TINGLE, LITTLETON and THOMAS TINGLE were not there. They had either died, or moved on to "greener pastures", such as Kentucky. [1 & 3]

I recently read the early tax records of Fayette County, KY., a microfilm. The first roll contains the tax records of 1778 thru 1804. Some of the pages are very difficult to read, and others are missing.....JASPER TINGLE first appears in 1792, but his name was spelled "Js^p Tinsley", (?????????) [45]....The following year, it was written exactly the same way.....In 1794, it was written correctly.

The other, Tingle men, listed above, appeared in FAYETTE CO., KY. tax lists also, beginning in 1796. [45]

JASPER TINGLE was among the citizens of Fayette Co., KY., in Lexington, being listed and counted, for the 1800 census & tax assessments. [2] The same index record also listed a JACOB TINGLE, living in Fleming County, KY. [2] JACOB was further identified, as a "TINGLEY", through Fleming Co., KY., court records of 1801. He was not a very pleasant man, and was always in trouble with his neighbors. He was dragged into court for trespassing, attacking and defaming, by those neighbors. One of those neighbors, tried to stab him; while another one beat him, causing "great bodily harm"; making it necessary for JACOB to bring his attackers into court.....At each of the four, court sessions, held in 1801, at Fleming Co., KY., there were several documents, for or against JACOB TINGLEY. [22] He was gone by 1810, and good riddance!!!!!!

Mr. Kerns found a tidbit, in a book, titled, "HISTORY OF PIONEER LEXINGTON", which he forwarded to me. It is, as follows: "On 7, December, 1802, JASPER TINGLE & THOMAS OCHILTREE, were appointed to be watchmen, at \$12.00 per month, working every other night." [9] On 12, December, 1802, REUBON RUNYON & EDWARD HARRISON, were also hired, to add to the group, to guard LEXINGTON, by night.

The wild animals and Indians were still a threat to the inhabitants of early, LEXINGTON, and it was not an unusual event, to find entire families, killed or kidnaped, by Indians. [37, 42 & 43]

Quoting from a book, "THE LAND OF THE MIAMIS", by BARSE:
"At the close of the French & Indian War, on 10 February, 1763, there was not one human, living on either side of the OHIO RIVER, at the falls, where LOUISVILLE would develop."

"Roving bands of MIAMI, SHAWNEES, CHEROKEES, and other tribes hunted there. No wood had been cut, and game was plentiful, such as: deer, elk, fleet stag, bear, fox, wolves, panther, wild cats, buffalo herds, and all sorts of winged and four footed creatures. Wild turkey & squirrels also were abundant....No one dared to take exclusive possession of the great hunting grounds."

"The Ohio River was the common highway of the Indian tribes & Rafts & Keel boats were the main forms of transport, for the early settlers of Kentucky, Indiana & Ohio."

"In 1774, JAMES HERROD built the first log cabin, in Kentucky. On 14 June, 1775, the first fort was completed at BOONSBOROUGH, KY. The first settlers were in very precarious territory, with Indians everywhere....It was still the Eden of the redman."

"In 1777, the entire army of Kentuckians amounted to 102 men. By 1790, there were 73,677 humans living there."

"On June 1, 1792, Kentucky became the 15th Commonwealth to the Federal Union." [37, 42 & 43]

A few years before Kentucky became a state, a walled, log, community was built, at Lexington, named: FORT LEXINGTON. Between 1779 & 1782, the fort grew, from a cabin sized structure; then a second story was added for a lookout; eventually, to look much like the enclosed drawing, as shown in the recent edition of "KENTUCKY EXPLORER", p. 68. As the fort became too small for the newcomers, farmers began taking-up larger tracts of land, along North & South Elkhorn & Cane Run & Town Fork, waterways adjacent to them.[42 & 43]

By the time that JASPER TINGLE, and the others arrived, in 1791 to 1794, the community of Lexington, Fayette County, Kentucky had outgrown Fort Lexington. However, the dangers of frontier life were ever present, for several years. [37, 42 & 43]

The enclosed cabin photos are examples of the homes our ancestors built, lived in, and raised large families; within those four walls. [42]

The 1810 census of Fayette County, Kentucky, at Lexington, listed the following family, as enumerated for JASPER TINGLE: [10]

- 1 male, under age 10 (b.1800-1810)
 - 2 males, age 10-15, (b.1795-1800)
 - 4 males, age 16-25, (b.1785-1794)
 - 1 male, age 45 or over, (b.1765 or before)= JASPER
 - 1 female, age 26-44, (b. 1766-1784)=Wife,()
 - 1 female, under age 10, (b.1800-1810)
 - 1 female, age 10-15, (b.1795-1800)
- A total of 11 people in the household.

At Henry County, Kentucky, other Tingles began to appear in the census records of 1810, plus tax lists and deed records. Some of the names that appeared on pp.367 & 368, of the Henry Co.,KY. census, microfilm, were the same as the ones listed in 1790, at Baltimore Hundred, Sussex County, Maryland. [28] & [1]..... The probable connection between those Tingles, has not been determined. However, I think it is quite safe, to say that they were at least cousins, if not brothers.

Tax listings of Lexington, Fayette Co., Kentucky, beginning in the early, 1800's, show JASPER TINGLE, as owner of 4 horses, and was over 21 years of age; and EBENEZER TINGLE, as owner of 10 acres of land, on Wolfrun, and was age 21, or over, by 1817. [12]

The 1820 Tax List for the same area, listed DAVID TINGLE, NATHANIEL TINGLE, JASPER TINGLE & EBENEZER: All white males of 21 or over. No acreages mentioned, but Jasper owned 4 horses. Also, no waterway mentioned. [12]

In the 1821 Tax List, for the same area, JASPER TINGLE owned 2 horses, and EBENEZER owned only, one horse. No acreage or waterway mentioned. [12]

The 1822 Tax List, of the same area, was the same as 1821, with JASPER & EBENEZER TINGLE, ONLY. [12]

The following year, in 1823, another Tingle had reached age 21, and was listed with the others: JESSE TINGLE, JASPER TINGLE, AND EBENEZER TINGLE. Ebenezer then owned 54 acres, on McConel.[12]

The 1823 & 1824 tax records of Versailles, Woodford, KY., listed DAVID TINGLE & NATHANIEL TINGLE, as partners, with 4, blacks, 6 horses, and 1 town lot. [13] &[40].....EBENEZER TINGLE was not listed with the others, after 1823.

By 1825, JASPER & JESSE TINGLE & families, had left Lexington, Fayette, KY., and were listed with DAVID & NATHANIEL TINGLE, in Versailles, Woodford, KY. [13]

The following year, 1826, JESSE TINGLE was not listed with the others, He had married, and moved to Jessamine Co.,KY. [27]

JASPER TINGLE was listed with NATHANIEL & DAVID TINGLE, in the 1826 tax record of Woodford County, KY.; it was also the last year of tax listings, at Woodford County, for all of them; as NATHANIEL & DAVID TINGLE sold lot #66, with cotton factory & two houses, in 1833.....David had married in 1824. He and his wife moved back to Lexington. Nathaniel moved his family to Mercer County, KY. [40, 41 & 21]

Some of the tax records are missing, or parts of pages torn, etc; hence the absence of listings, between 1826 & 1836..... NATHANIEL TINGLE appears in Mercer County records, beginning in 1837, and ends in 1853. [21]....After Nathaniel moved to Versailles, and purchased half of lot #66; he married his first wife, who died within two years.....Between 1822 & 1839, he married three

times: To SALLY JONES, 10 April, 1822, Fayette County, KY.; To ELIZABETH YOUNG, 17 Nov., 1824, Woodford Co., KY.; and to SARAH R. WHITENACK, 15 April, 1839, Mercer County, KY. (They were my 2x Great-Gr. Parents).... Yes, there will be much more about NATHANIEL & SARAH R. WHITENACK TINGLE, later. [4,5,17 & 21]

It appears that JASPER & his wife, () died, sometime between 1830 and 1840. However, I haven't found any evidence of their burial place, so far. It is also possible, that they moved away from Kentucky, with one of their children. No evidence of that either, so far. [18]

JASPER TINGLE was a farmer, most of his years, so it is quite probable that he and his wife were buried on the farm of one of their children.

Using the 1810 Census listing of JASPER TINGLE & family, as a guideline, I believe the following list of Tingles, were the family of that pioneer, couple.....Without proof, I must use: tax lists; census records; age groups; deed & indenture records; and geographic locations, in 1800 to 1840..(2,10,14,17,27]

- 1...JEPHTHA TINGLE, born ca. 1786, DE.; married HARRIET (), as per 1860 census of Owen Co., KY., p.140 of microfilm, at New Columbus. (This is a very questionable identification.) [16]
- 2...JAMES S. TINGLE, born ca.1788, DE.; married ANNA CATHERINE HUGHES, on 20 or 30 Sept., 1821, Lexington, Fayette, KY. (Identified as son, only by his marriage listing in Fayette County; making this a very questionable identification.) [5]
- 3...EBENEZER TINGLE, born ca. 1791, Kentucky, (probably Fayette County); married MARY WHEELER, 2 November, 1826, Fayette County, KY.; Veteran of War of 1812; moved to Jacksonville, Morgan County, Illinois, about 1834; died ca. 1859, Illinois. Had 10 children. [19 & 33 & 5]
Mary's father was WARREN WHEELER, as per marriage record.

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- 4...DAVID TINGLE, born 1792, Kentucky, (probably Fayette Co.) married SALLY (), ca. 1824?,(probably Woodford Co.) Sally born in Virginia; as per 1860 Census of Fayette Co., KY., p.479 of microfilm; David died 10 Dec.,1849 " " [4 & 5, 12 & 13] Had 1 son, DAVID TINGLE, JR., who became a Physician, but died at age 36, in 1861.[7] 2 ch'dn.
- 5...NATHANIEL TINGLE, born 22 Dec.,1795, Fayette County, KY.; married #1-SALLY JONES, 1822, Fayette County, KY.,no children; #2-ELIZABETH YOUNG, 1824, Woodford Co.,KY; Six children were born, before Eliza died, in 1837; Marr. #3-SARAH R. WHITENACK, 1839, Mercer County, KY.; They lived near Salvisa; Had 5 children, before moving to Pleasant Twp., Johnson County, Indiana, in 1855. Another child born in Indiana. Only the last, 7 children have been identified, to date.(More about this family, later.) [4,5,17 & 21]
- 6...JESSE TINGLE, born 14 Dec.,1799, Fayette County, KY.; married SARAH C. PLUNKETT, 2 Feb., 1824, Fayette Co.; Sarah was the daughter of REUBIN PLUNKETT. She was born 15 July, 1801, in KY.; Jesse died 15 Oct.,1854, & Sarah died 10 Mar.,1866. Both are buried in the Lexington Cem., on Main St., Lex.,KY.; had 6 or 7 children.This is the ancestor of AMANDA HERNDON WASCAK, a recent addition to our "TINGLE DESCENDANTS" group. (More about this family, later.) [4,5,6,12,15, & 27]
- 7...POLLY TINGLE, born ca. 1800, (probably Fayette Co.,KY); married HENRY OWENS, 14 Oct., 1815, Henry County, KY. [34] Identified as the daughter of JASPER TINGLE, in "BLUE GRASS ROOTS, Henry County, KY. Marriage Bonds, 1798-1851.", from JUANITA VINSON....No further knowledge of this family, at present. [34]
- 8...WILLIAM R. TINGLE, born 1803, Kentucky; married #1-NANCY BARTLETT, 25 Jan.,1825, Henry Co.,KY; Moved to Montgomery County, Illinois, about 1829-30; NANCY died ca. 1860, at Montgomery Co., IL.; #2 marriage-MARY ANN PARISH SANDERS, 10 Feb.,1853, IBID...Nine children by

his first wife, NANCY BARTLETT TINGLE.....JUANITA VINSON, a fellow "TINGLE DESCENDANT", Is descended from SARAH ANN TINGLE BURT, the first daughter of WM. R. TINGLE & NANCY BARTLETT TINGLE. Some of the above information is from JUANITA. Other sources were: 1860 Illinois Census and I.G.I. microfiche No.9,716; 1860 census of Irving, Montgomery Co., Illinois, p.302 of R.G. 312, Micro Copy #653, Roll 214;[34] Also see "T.D." newsletter, Vol.I, No.4, 1988, pp.9 & 10. (This Wm.R. Tingle could also be son of THOMAS)

9...KITTY (SUSAN?) TINGLE, born ca. 1805, probably at Fayette Co.,KY.; married MASON OWENS, Baptist Preacher, (no date given for marriage) [34] Their first child was born in 1835, so they probably married ca. 1834, Henry County, KY.; Had 9 children by 1850 census of Woodford County, KY., pp.487 & 488....No further info, to date. Identified as the daughter of JASPER TINGLE, in "BLUE GRASS ROOTS, Henry County, KY. Marriage Bonds, 1798-1851." from JUANITA VINSON.

With the exception of the two, daughters, above, the identifications are tentative, and open for discussion, criticism and argument. I would like to hear from you.
