DOLLI TINGLE BRACKETT
(1916-1993)

This issue of our newsletter begins on a sad note. Regretfully, we report the death of one of its founders, Mrs. Dolli Tingle Brackett, of Westport, Connecticut, on December 11, 1993.

Dolli, who was 78, died in Norwalk Hospital, Norwalk, Conn. from respiratory failure, according to her son, Gordon Brackett.

She was one of the three charter members who helped to launch our newsletter in September, 1987. During the ensuing years she wrote numerous articles which helped to not only document her descent from George Tingle, Revolutionary War soldier, but enabled others to do likewise. She had a marvelous sense of humor and was able to communicate this gift in her writings.

Dolli was a top notch artist and painter, as well as a designer of books and rugs. She created and drew eight Christmas stamps for the United States Postal Service. We have attempted to illustrate four of them in this issue of the newsletter. The reproduction of her obituary in the New York Times of December 19 shows one and is a testament to her stature in the field of art. (P.S. Even THE TIMES makes mistakes - Dolli's age was 78, not 82).

But we Tingle descendants knew her best for the masthead which she designed in 1987 and which has appeared on every quarterly issue of our newsletter since then. She did this gratuitously and enthusiastically. It was emblematic of her generous spirit and her love for the name, Tingle, which she used professionally.

Dolli is survived by her husband of 53 years, Ward Brackett of Westport, a noted portrait painter, and by her son, Gordon Brackett, of Ridgefield, Conn.

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Dolli T. Brackett,
A Designer of Stamps

Dolli Tingle Brackett, an artist and designer of Christmas stamps for the Postal Service, died on Dec. 11 in Norwalk Hospital, Norwalk, Conn. She was 82.

The cause of death was respiratory failure, her son, Gordon Brackett, said.

Mrs. Brackett lived in Westport, Conn., for 47 years, and also had a winter residence and studio in Sarasota, Fla. Known professionally as Dolli Tingle, she exhibited her oils and watercolors in many museums and galleries on the East Coast.

In 1973, using needlepoint, she designed one of most popular stamps issued by the Postal Service, a depiction of a Christmas tree decorated with traditional ornaments, which drew upon memories of her childhood in Chicago. It took her 10 days to complete her needlepoint design using two strands of wool.

For her work on the Christmas stamp she was voted Woman of the Year by the American Needlepoint Guild. In all, she designed eight Christmas stamps for the Postal Service.

Mrs. Brackett, who studied at the Chicago Academy of Fine Arts, was also a painter who exhibited nationally, as well as a designer of books and rugs. She is survived by her husband of 53

years, Ward Brackett of Westport, a portrait painter who also designs stamps for the Postal Service, and her son, Gordon Brackett of Ridgefield, Conn.

STAMPS

One of '86 Christmas stamps will make debut at Snow Hill

One of the two Christmas stamps that will go on sale late next month will have its first day of issue at Snow Hill, in Worcester County, the ancestral home of the artist who designed the stamp. Ceremonies will be held in the Snow Hill Senior High School on Oct. 24.

The other Christmas stamp, based on a painting that hangs in the National Gallery, will have its first day of issue in Washington on the same day.

For the first time in seven years, both the so-called traditional Christmas stamp, with a design taken from one of the Old Masters, and the stamp using a contemporary design will both be the size of regular rather than commemorative stamps.

The contemporary stamp, designed by Dolli Tingle, now of Westport, Conn., the artist with Maryland connections, features a winter village scene. She said it is not something she can see from her studio window but what she thinks of as "a typical village scene you might find almost anywhere in the country."

This is the fifth time she has designed contemporary Christmas stamps. Her first was the 1973 issue, Christmas Tree in Needlepoint; then the 1977 Rural Mailbox; the 1978 Hobby Horse, and the 1982 Season's Greetings block of four stamps.

The one this year makes a total of eight designs, which puts her even with her artist husband, Ward Brackett, whose stamp designs in the last few years have been portraits, including those of Rachel Carson, Henry Clay and Lillian Gbraith.

Ms. Tingle said that until she broke the trend, her family had gradually been moving west for several generations. A great-great-grandfather left the Eastern Shore for Martinsburg, W.Va. (then still part of Virginia), and one of his sons moved to Cambridge, Ohio.

Both the stamp artist and her father were born in Chicago, where the father ran an ad agency and

gave her the pet name Dolli, which serves instead of three Christian names. Her stamp designs are not the only phases of her work that have been connected in one way or another with Christmas.

As a young artist she designed Christmas cards and has illustrated gift books intended for the Christmas market. One very successful one was prepared with grandmothers in mind.

The artist will be present for next month's stamp ceremonies at Snow Hill, on the Ocean City side of the Pocomoke River. "I wouldn't miss it," she said. "Who knows, I may have time for some genealogical research."

The new Christmas stamp will be the third stamp in the last 15 years to have its first day of issue in Maryland. The 6-cent Tricycle stamp in the current Transportation Series, issued in May 1985 at Childs, in Cecil County, was the last. Preceding that was the John Hanson stamp, issued in Frederick in May 1981.

Maryland has been host of the first-day ceremonies for four pieces of postal stationery in the last 15 years: the John Hanson postal card in 1972, Maryland's 350th birthday card in 1984 and the two Charles Carroll postal cards last year.

BERNIE TINGLE WOODSON (1912-1993)

From Mrs. Dixie Tingle Willis of New Bern, North Carolina, we have learned of the death of her long time friend, Mrs. Bernie Tingle Woodson of Tulsa, Oklahoma. She died this past December 4. Natives of Pamlico County, North Carolina, Mrs. Woodson was born in Alliance, while Mrs. Willis was born ten miles away in Arapahoe.

Through her late father, James Arthur Tingle, Mrs. Woodson was a direct descendant from Hugh Tingle, II of Maryland and the latter's son, Joseph Tingle. Hugh, II, sold his lands in Maryland and migrated to eastern North Carolina in 1750, accompanied by sons, Joseph and Hugh, III. This Hugh Tingle, II, was a son of Hugh Tingle, the progenitor, who came from England into the Province of Maryland in 1669. Thus, Mrs. Woodson was descended from the very oldest Tingle line in America.

The staff of the newsletter extends its sympathy to the family of Mrs. Woodson. She had been a reader and loyal contributor of the paper since its inception.

BERNIE TINGLE WOODSON

Bernie Tingle Woodson, 81, of Tulsa, Oklahoma died suddenly at home December 4.

She was born in Alliance on January 5, 1912 and lived there until moving to Richmond, Va. She married the late Charles Sutton Woodson in 1935 and has been a Tulsa resident since 1945. She was

a member of First Presbyterian Church and Kiwanitas. She was a long-time member of Oaks Country Club and the Petroleum Club.

She is survived by a son, Charles Sutton Woodson, Jr. of Coroe, Texas; daughter, Nancy Kincaid of Tulsa; 3 grandchildren; and 2 great-grandchildren.

Funeral service was held at Kerr Chapel, First Presbyterian Church with burial in Memorial Park Cemetery.

DALLAS M. MORRISON, SR.

Dallas M. Morrison, Sr., 65, of Conewango Valley, New York, died 13 Dec. 1993 in WCA Hospital after a long illness.

He was a veteran of the U. S. Air Force and retired from the Carborundum Company in 1990. He and his wife, the former Ellen Marie Hanlon, were married 28 July 1947 in Oklahoma City, Okla. In addition to his wife, he is survived by four sons, a daughter and seven grandchildren.

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SIX GENERATIONS OF TINGLES
STARTING WITH JAMES TINGLE OF DELAWARE (1765-1849)

One of the joys in editing our family newsletter is to receive surprise letters, out of the blue so speak, which are chock full of hitherto undisclosed Tingle family information. I refer to a recent communication sent to Mrs. Dixie T. Willis of New Bern, North Carolina, by Mrs. Nancy Tingle Tilman of San Jose, California. From there it went to Mrs. Sarah E. T. Everding, our present treasurer, and then arrived on my desk.

The letter was the result of a visit that Mrs. Tilman and her husband, Ted, had with Mr. Tom Tingle and the latter's wife, Chris, in Williamsburg, Virginia. Tom happened to mention the family newsletter and showed them the article about his father, Dr. Norman Rock Tingle, Sr., in Vol. 4 - No. 1, pp. 10-15.

By coincidence that same issue included a story about James Tingle of Delaware, his son William and grandson, Manaan. Mrs. Tilman instantly recognized the names as those ancestors from whom she is descended. This was possible because her grandfather, John Beard Tingle, PD (1877-1953) of Philadelphia, Pa. compiled a record in 1926 from his family Bible. The latter looks as if it was begun in the 1840's, says Mrs. Tilman.

We are happy to include her Tingle line of descent which covers six generations going back to James Tingle and his wife, Leah Lockwood Tingle, of Delaware (1769-1850). Also included are the two generations since 1926. The information given therein is a model for any family to emulate when outlining a family history. Our congratulations and thanks to you, Mr. and Mrs. Tilman.

Among our readers there must be other descendants of James and Leah Lockwood Tingle. The problem now is to identify the parents of this James Tingle. The fact that he was a native of Delaware lends credence to the belief that he could be a descendant in the fourth and fifth generation from Hugh Tingle, the progenitor. Please - dig out your old Bibles and records and try to solve this mystery. There are many of us who will be most grateful.

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ARCHIBALD DANIEL TINGLE OF GEORGIA (1835-1917)
AND NEW INFORMATION ON PRESENT DAY DESCENDANTS.

Mr. Boyd Monroe Tingle of Wimberley, Texas is a new contributor to our newsletter and has sent an interesting old photograph of his great grandfather, Archibald Daniel Tingle, and the latter's family.

He believes the picture was taken in 1909, probably just after the funeral of Archibald Daniel's wife, Mary Mahala Treadwell Tingle, whose death occurred on 8 September 1909. This couple were long-time residents of Monroe County, Georgia. Archibald Daniel served in the Confederate Army. He was a prosperous farmer and storekeeper, and a member of the Baptist Church. They were the parents of nine children and are buried in Mount Vernon Baptist Church Cemetery, Butts County, Georgia (see article titled 'Monroe Memories' by Mrs. Joan K. Tingle in Vol. 2 - No. 2, pp. 3 - 6 of our newsletter).

Boyd Monroe Tingle and his wife, Patricia Lucille Barber Tingle, are the parents of one daughter, Tricia Annette Tingle. In the words of her father, "She is truly a dedicated attorney, especially to the Indian Child Welfare Act. She defends and protects the Indian children like a tiger." For an informative story about this devoted woman, we are pleased to reproduce an enlightening article by Steve Levin in the Dallas Morning News of November 30, 1993.

Boyd Tingle's maternal grandmother, Melvina Carnes, was a full blood Choctaw Indian, who married John Washington Goode, an Irishman. "So we know," says Boyd, "that my great grandparents were full blood Choctaw." Continuing he writes "My mother's parents died when she was five years old. She attended a Government School in Eastern Oklahoma. So the knowledge she had of her parents and grandparents was really limited."

Family Group Charts of Boyd Tingle's line of Tingle descent, as well as his Choctaw Indian line of descent are included. We thank him and his family for sharing all this long hidden information for the benefit of other Tingle descendants. It is hoped that others will search for old photos, Bibles, letters, records, etc. and then send them to our family newsletter so that more of us will learn about our Tingle heritage.

A NATIVE DAUGHTER TAKES A STAND

*Tricia Tingle works
to educate the public
about tribal issues*

SAN MARCOS, Texas — Tricia Tingle is mad. Invectives about an obstreperous lawyer opposing her fill her Chevrolet Celebrity. The lawyer has refused to settle out of court on a case. So now she's hurtling along outside of town on an errand, one eye searching for her destination, the other fixed on her white-knuckled passenger

while her hands pound out legal points on the steering wheel. So involved in her tirade is Ms. Tingle that she misses the address and has to backtrack.

Once parked safely outside the building, she smooths her brown hair and straightens her sweater. "I try to give everybody a chance," she says. "I bend over backwards for people. But if they cross me I can go for the throat."

It's all so frustrating when you want to do the right thing, the fair thing, and someone blocks your path. Nothing frustrates the 38-year-old Ms. Tingle more and nothing is more likely to make her take root, stand fast and fight harder. Since opening her family-law practice three years ago, she has seen it happen too often in the divorce and child custody cases she handles: as an American Indian, she's seen it happen her whole life.

Her drive to "do the right thing" begets an energy that fuels her life, not only in her private practice but also as national president of the Native American Bar Association. Her office phone is on permanent ring; judges perplexed by Indian Child Welfare Act laws, a woman harassed by an ex-boyfriend, an Indian woman in Amarillo who needs legal help, the White House with a question about Indian affairs, the president of another minority law association wondering if she'll be at an upcoming conference, other Indian lawyers seeking advice — all of them are calling Tricia Tingle for answers.

Some answers she has. It was Ms. Tingle, a member of the Choctaw tribe, who stepped in to alert Central Texas state court judges that custody disputes involving Indian children were subject to a different set of standards than other custody cases. She then provided judges with a flow chart to help them determine both the jurisdiction and placement of the children. It was Ms. Tingle who was a founding member of the Texas Indian Bar Association as well as its first president. It was Ms. Tingle who represented Texas last year at the White House Conference on Indian Education. And it was Ms. Tingle who established the first computer message center for the national Native American Bar Association, allowing other Indian attorneys instant access to legal issues around the country.

To Ms. Tingle, those accomplishments and efforts are part of a concerted effort to educate the public about American Indians, to make people aware that even with a population of only 2 million — 70,000 in Texas — they are one of the fastest-growing ethnic groups in the country, and have the youngest median age.

And then there are the other numbers: American Indian students' 40 percent dropout rate; the highest unemployment rate of any racial group in the United States; an estimated one out of every six Indian teen-agers attempting suicide; 38 percent of Indian adult men dying before the age of 45.

She's realistic about the task: "Indians are only one half of 1 percent of the population," she says over a cup of coffee in a cafe on the San Marcos courthouse square. "Educating the rest of the 99.5 percent of the population about your goals and aspirations isn't easy."

One way she hopes to do that is by opening an Austin law office next spring, along with another American Indian attorney, that will handle only Indian legal issues.

But until that happens, much of her time has been spent educating judges and lawyers about the Indian Child Welfare Act, which helps determine foster-care placement, termination of parental rights, pre-adoptive placement or adoption, placement for Indian children.

Confusing laws

Because of American Indians' unique status (each of the 510 federally recognized Indian tribes is considered its own sovereign country), they are affected by federal, tribal and, in some cases, state law. Nowhere have the laws proved more confusing than in adoption cases involving Indian children.

Studies by Oklahoma Indian Legal Services Inc. found that in every state studied where data was available, more than 75 percent of the Indian children adopted were placed with non-Indians. The results are children cut off from familial ties and heritage; in effect, they're lost between two cultures.

Indian children should be raised within their culture, Ms. Tingle says, because of the importance Indian communities place on all levels of communication — verbal, nonverbal, historical, legendary.

Ms. Tingle learned all this growing up in Freeport and Wimberley as the only child of a white Irish Catholic mother and a Choctaw father. She spent Saturdays with her "white grandmother" and Sundays with Oktoachoma, her dad's mother. On Sundays, her father's six siblings and their children would

gather for a family meal, and it was there that Ms. Tingle learned about her heritage through lessons taught by her aunts and uncles.

Her friends never really asked about her Indian heritage, she says.

"They asked more about my dad than about me because of his dark skin color and because of my lack of dark color. My features are Indian features; I have high Indian cheekbones but blue eyes and brown hair. If you would put me in the eastern part of Oklahoma, I'd fit in."

Oklahoma roots

Oklahoma is the spawning ground for many of the forces that guide Ms. Tingle today. Her dad's mother, a full Choctaw, was born there. Orphaned at 5, she spent her formative years in an Eastern boarding school. The 180 acres of land promised to her and hundreds of other Cherokee and Choctaw tribe members was illegally sold by the government while she was away at school. The grandmother later married a white man and eventually settled in Houston.

"My grandmother taught me a lot without even knowing it," Ms. Tingle says. Things like the importance of family, the awareness of how one's actions affect others, dignity and hard work. "She had diabetes and glaucoma but she would still cook family meals every Sunday for 32 people."

After graduating from San Marcos High school and then hometown Southwest Texas State University in 1978, Ms. Tingle embarked on a seven-year career teaching first grade. It was an easy choice for her; both parents were teachers and she was good with children.

But while Ms. Tingle loved the kids, she also realized that she wanted something more. Her three years at the Oklahoma City University law school were a wake-up call. Surrounded by one of the strongest Indian legal communities in the country, Ms. Tingle thrived. And it was there, she says, that she found her calling.

Ms. Tingle realized that she

could merge her heritage and her joy of working with children by becoming a family law attorney, specifically dealing with the Indian Child Welfare Act.

In quick succession she founded and became the first president of the Texas Indian Bar Association in 1991, and then was drafted by one of her former law professors to succeed him as president of the national board. When she's not at the office handling her family or criminal law cases, she's busy on the association's issues.

Changing lives

She has a knack for affecting people's lives. Whether it's her persistence or her energy level or just her need to do what she believes is right, Tricia Tingle changes people. Like Travis County Court Judge John Russell, whom she challenged repeatedly about his Indian heritage.

"She outed me, as it were," says Mr. Russell, a judge for 16 years.

"See, I was born with the name Teehee. It's a real common name in the Cherokee nation. When I was 21 years old I got rid of it in a San Antonio district court and I kind of went off and played the white guy for a number of years.

"Maybe I was escaping being an Indian, because once she outed me . . . all of a sudden I was getting involved in Indian issues when I didn't even know any Indian issues existed."

She's had a similar impact with the start-up of Great Promise, a non-profit program aimed at educating Indian children and encouraging them to strive for success. One of the first projects of the group is a magazine geared toward fifth-through eighth-grade children. The first issue is expected by Christmas. Ms. Tingle is Great Promise's foundation director.

"Tricia has supported us from the beginning on this because of her desire to get relevant curriculum and educational material to Indian children," says David Pego, founder of Great Promise. "She is helping take Indian children into a new era of improved education."

Part of that will be to try and expand the public schools' awareness of Indian student needs. The Dallas Independent School District, for instance, has 651 Indian students in pre-kindergarten through 12th grade.

Representing at least 43 different tribes, the children make up less than one half of 1 percent of total DISD enrollment. Nearly one out of every seven Indian students in middle through high school drop out, district records show. This month, the district for the first time will hire a staff member to work with at-risk Indian students, primarily in middle schools, says Peggy Larney, specialist for the DISD's American Indian education program.

"That's exactly the kind of missed opportunities for Indian children we want to target," Ms. Tingle says.

"One of my uncles once told me that if you put something in the ground you're responsible for it. That means if you do an act, you're responsible for the consequence of that act. I feel like my nonstop talking about all these things is a way to educate people.

"I know if I keep pounding, if I keep talking, there are people out there who will begin to understand about Indians. Somebody somewhere will understand that Indians are not archaic individuals who were here and died out. We are here, we have needs and we need to educate people about that."
