ARE YOU A TINGLE?

JAMES TINGLE - LEAH LOCKWOOD
1765-1849 1769-1850

The above heading will certainly gain the attention of every reader of our family newsletter. As noted on the following page, it was used to promote a TINGLE REUNION held in Richmond, Indiana, on August 8, 1926.

Through the courtesy of Mrs. Nancy Tingle Tilman of San Jose, California, we reproduce a copy of this 'flyer'. Mrs. Tilman is a direct descendant, in the 7th generation, of James Tingle and his wife, Leah Lockwood Tingle. Her line of descent is through JOHN TINGLE, one of the eight children of James and Leah. (See Vol. 7 - No. 3, pp. 5,6,7 of 'TINGLE DESCENDANTS')

Mrs. Tilman reasons that her grandfather, JOHN BEARD TINGLE (1877-1953), who was born in Dayton, Ohio, and died in West Philadelphia, Pa., became interested in his family ancestry as a result of this 'flyer'. A family Bible came into his possession which contained entries going back to the birth of JAMES TINGLE, November 30, 1765.

As a consequence of all of this, Mrs. Tilman became engrossed in the Tingle family records and has sent much valuable information on certain descendants of James and Leah Lockwood Tingle. This couple was born in Sussex County, Delaware, and married there on 7 Dec. 1791. They were communicants in Prince George's Episcopal Church, Dagsboro, Delaware.

In 1828 they emigrated to Eaton, Preble County, Ohio. He was then 63 and she 59. About that time, other families in Sussex County, Delaware, moved to Eaton, Ohio - among them, the Josiah Campbell family. Two years after arriving in Eaton, James Tingle joined the Methodist Church, according to the 1881 history of Preble County, Ohio.

Three of the eight children of James and Leah Lockwood Tingle went to Eaton, Ohio. They were JOHN (ancestor of Mrs. Tilman), NATHANIEL, II, who later went to Washington Township, Wayne County, Indiana, and SAMUEL LOCKWOOD TINGLE. Two others - NATHANIEL, I, and NANCY died before they were a year old, while a third child, MOLLEY, died at age 15. The remaining two children, ELISHA and WILLIAM stayed in Delaware; many of their descendants continue to live on the Eastern Shore of Delaware and Maryland.

Please note that two Tingles, "Mary S." and "Walter J." formed a Committee on Family History and Genealogy. Who can identify them? Miss Mary S. Tingle resided at 220 West Somers Street, Eaton, Ohio, in 1926; so it would seem that she was a direct descendant of JAMES TINGLE through one of his children. So far, her name, and the name of Walter J. Tingle, have not surfaced in our research. Do any of our readers have any record of these TINGLE ANNUAL REUNIONS held in Glen Miller Park, Richmond, Indiana? LEONARD EARL TINGLE OF MERIDIAN, MISSISSIPPI (1931-1994)

Our alert staff member, Mrs. Ann T. Lila of Mesa, Arizona, sent the obituary and picture below of Leonard Earl Tingle, taken from The Meridian Star of 1 May 1994. Mr. Tingle had a brilliant career in the Army and afterwards in the Mississippi National Guard. Following retirement from the Army, he lived on his grandfather Tingle's homeplace at Arundel, near Meridian, Mississippi. He was interested in Tingle family history.

Mrs. Lila prepared the excellent Ancestry Chart which details his Tingle ancestry going back to Solomon Tingle of Craven County, North Carolina, two hundred years ago. Leonard Earl Tingle was a seventh generation descendant.

Leonard Earl Tingle

Services for Leonard Earl Tingle will be held Monday at 10 a.m. at Webb Funeral Home chapel with the Rev. Virgil Hutcherson, the Rev. Barry Skelton and the Rev. Howard McKee officiating. Burial will be in Sageville United Methodist Church Cemetery.

Mr. Tingle, 62, of Meridian, died Friday April 29, 1994 at Riley Memorial Hospital. He was a retired lieutenant colonel, serving a distinguished and brilliant military career of 42 years. He went to Korea in July, 1950 as a ranger with the 2nd Ranger Co., 8th Army, as a corporal, and received a battlefield commission to second lieutenant. He was reassigned to the 25th Infantry Division and by extending his combat tour was promoted to first lieutenant. Total combat time was 18 months. His next assignment was a company commander with the 101st Airborne and as captain, commanding officer of an infantry company in Germany. Captain Tingle then was only 22 years old, the youngest captain in the U.S. Army as published in Army Times. Through schooling and U.C.L.A. he advanced to major. His proudest accomplishment was setting up the army helicopter training schools at Fort Walters and Camp Gary, Texas and Fort Rucker, Ala. Col. Tingle flew fixed wing aircraft and helicopters. Upon leaving active duty, he entered the Mississippi National Guard of the 123rd Air Ambulance Co.

Where he was active in forming and was a first commander of the Mississippi Army Aviation Maintenance Shop which was the predecessor of the now Army Aviation Support Facility Located at Key Field. Upon army retirement he entered the Mississippi National Guard at Meridian as a commanding officer and retired at the rank of lieutenant colonel. He was also a member of Sageville United

Survivors include his wife, Mary Nell Spenser Tingle of Meridian; two daughters, Debbie Tingle Wedgeworth of Meridian, and Jane Welman of Evansville, Ind.; two sons, Shayne Tingle of Jackson, and Steven Locyar of Evansville, Ind.; two sisters, Marion Barber of Chunky, and Shirley King of Burton, Texas; four brothers, Charles Tingle, and

Wayne Tingle, both of Meridian, J.P. Tingle of San Antonio, Texas, and Milton H. Tingle of Fair Oaks, Calif.; two grandchildren, Brandon Wedgeworth of Meridian and Alex Welman of Evansville, Ind.

"ANOTHER OLD SOLDIER HAS ANSWERED HIS LORD'S SUMMONS!"

Our story on ARCHIBALD DANIEL TINGLE OF Georgia in Vol. 7- No. 3, pp. 8,9 of 'TINGLE DESCENDANTS' has elicited a number of letters. One is a clipping from the Monroe County Advertiser of 30 March 1917 which is reproduced below. Our thanks to Mrs. Jane Newton of Forsyth, Georgia, for her continuing interest in our newsletter.

ANOTHER OLD SOLDIER HAS ANSWERED HIS LORD'S SUMMONS

"The muffled drum's sad roll has beat
The soldier's last tattoo;
No more on Life's parade shall meet
That brave and fallen few.
On Fame's eternal camping-ground
Their silent tents are spread,
And Glory guards, with solemn round,
The shrine of the dead."

On the night of March 24th, one more silent tent was spread on this eternal camping ground. It was for Mr. Archibald Daniel Tingle, who quietly passed away at 7 o'clock Saturday night, and went to join his wife and son, Dan.

Mr. Tingle was born in the fourth district of Monroe county in 1834. This was his home the whole time of his stay on earth. His departure has cast a cloud of sadness over not only his community but over all the miles around, for he was well loved by everyone that knew him.

When twenty-one years old he married Mary Mahala Treadwell, who made him a gentle, faithful, loving wife. But she was called in 1910 to her rest.

Not only was he true to his home and friends, but to his South, also. When the South called for soldiers in the beginning of the War Between the States, he answered the summons. For four years he faithfully followed his leader, and here, as at home, he did not shirk a single duty. No matter what hardships presented themselves, he gladly endured them. At the close of the war he came home to his wife and children to begin life over with what the Yankees had left him and to live in peace the rest of his life.

Although he did not unite himself with any church until his later years, his influence was always for good, and now his light will be greatly missed. He leaves two daughters, Mrs. W. H. Craig and Mrs. R. L. Smith, and six sons, Messrs. W. A. Tingle, Jas. A. Tingle, S. G. Tingle, Jno. A. Tingle, O. F. Tingle and J. T. Tingle.

JOHN LESLIE TINGLE OF PENNSYLVANIA (1906-1957)

Back in November 1988, Elaine Mitchell of Lakewood, Ohio, sent to your editor microfilm prints of obituaries appearing in the New York Times for various Tingles. One was JOHN LESLIE TINGLE of Pennsylvania, who remained unidentified in our pages until early this year. At that point, his daughter, Mrs. Nancy Tingle Tilman of San Jose, CA produced an old family Bible and wrote an interesting story and history which we inserted in our family newsletter, Vol. 7, No. 3, pp. 5,6,7.

JOHN LESLIE TINGLE

"Philadelphia, April 22, 1957.

John Leslie Tingle a contracting engineer for the Bethlehem Steel Company, died Saturday. His age was 50. He lived in suburban Marion.

Mr. Tingle graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in 1928. He was a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers, the American Welding Society and the Engineers Club of Philadelphia.

Surviving are his widow, Carrie; a son, John C.; two daughters, Nancy Anne and Elizabeth Lydia, and a sister."

Mrs. Tilman said that the sister's name was Elizabeth M. Tingle and that she became a nun and died in Oct. 1963. She is buried in Victoria, British Columbia, Canada.

RALPH TINGLE OF WICOMICO COUNTY, MARYLAND (1907 -)

ENDURING MEMORIES OF SIMPLER TIMES!

Long history gives Truitt's Corner a real down-home feel

All day and all night, cars and trucks roar by Truitt's Corner, a Wicomico County community of about 50 folks. But the traffic is a small price to pay for living here. The heart of the neighborhood is marked by the Route 353 and Tingle Road intersection. For new residents their home is near Pittsville, near the state line between Maryland and Delaware, or a few miles east of Delmar. To older residents though, their home is called Truitt's Corner.

Mrs. Harold White has been here 45 years and she said the community really doesn't have a name but the older crowd, especially those born here, still call the place Truitt's Corner.

Born in 1907, Ralph Tingle lives next door to the Tingle and Tingle country store at the intersection. "Nobody in the neighborhood as old as I am, outlived them all," he said.

His family came from England in the 18th century, moved to Snow Hill and came to this part of the Shore. So typical of old Eastern Shore families, Tingle was born here and spent all of his life in the neighborhood, in the home his grandfather built almost a century ago.

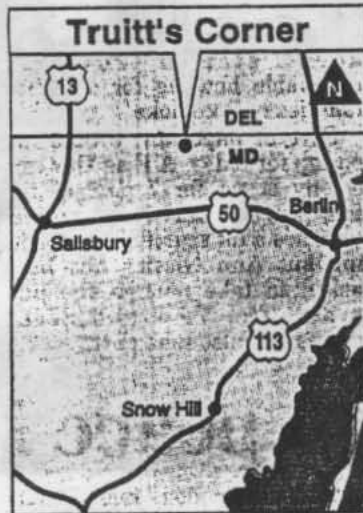
And from his home, in any direction, are thousands of acres of farmland, once small farms of 50 acres or so, Tingle said.

On a sunny, warm day with the gentlest of breezes, this bit of Delmarva offers the look and feel of a bygone era. Even though the people who have made the history of Truitt's Corner are gone, the life they made here is still evident and gives the place a down-home, relaxed mood. It is, said White, a wonderful pace to live. "I really love it here, all 45 years," she said.

Early life

Traces of early life at Truitt's Corner could be found when Tingle was a boy. His grandfather Truitt had orchards for making hard cider and vinegar. On his grandfather's

farm was an early house, three stories tall with "walls with wooden boards 12 inches wide, old-growth pine," with fireplaces. The grandfather used it to store buggies and carriages. Only one old house out of a half-dozen that may have dated to the 18th century were "kept up," Tingle said. Even the house he was born and lived in until after World War II was burned down a month or so ago, and the old Farlow School not far down the road and across the field burned just a few weeks ago, too.

And it was just down the road a piece where Samuel Joseph Richie Holloway lived in the late 1800s. That house is gone, too. He worked for Ratlift Farlow, a

nearby resident who served as an undertaker to many of Truitt Corner's families.

"My grandfather started the family business in Pittsville," said Richard Holloway of Holloway Funeral Home in Salisbury.

"My father, Walter Radcliffe Holloway, got his middle name from Ratlift, but he changed it to Radcliffe. I got tired of saying rat-lift," Holloway said.

"Later my grandfather decided he'd move west. He moved as far as Salisbury and quit. Gladys Cleary Baysinger, our organist who started with us in 1934 (and the organist for many years at Bethesda United Methodist Church in Salisbury), was born in the house where my grandparents lived (near Truitt's Corner). Her father, Thomas Cleary, had a vault company in Salisbury which later became National Concrete Vault Company. The name has been changed but the firm is still in business," he said.

A memorable Fourth

"Used to be gypsies go around and they would tell your fortune. And they told a man near here his wife was having an affair with his neighbor. He shot his wife and shot and killed himself, on the Fourth of July. Maybe 75 years ago," he said.

And it was on the holiday that all the local folks gathered for a special picnic at the church.

"It was held every Fourth of July and a lot of people came. The day of the murder they left the church to see but I was a boy, I didn't want to go.

"At the picnic on the Fourth of July they had a band from Gumboro play. They had a pole up with a box they built fire in, and of course they had firecrackers and things they would sell. Out to the school, Nellie Truitt, one of my teachers, had an Edison Victrola she brought out there. Every Sunday you went to Sunday school they gave you a ticket to use on the Fourth of July. If you went all 52 weeks you got 52

cents. Some years you didn't have nothing in the treasury so it was only worth half that much.

ENDURING MEMORIES OF SIMPLER TIMES AND CARS ARRIVE IN TRUITT'S CORNER!

"After WWII my brother, James, and I ran it and I still have the safe. My brother ran it before then, during the Great Depression. He went broke and sold it. A neighbor bought it for \$1,600, so the neighbor ran it up to the war," he said.

Tingle still has the old book ledger from 1911, with accounts of almost all the locals at that time, including Thomas Hearne, Elijah Downs, Daniel Parson, T.A. Parson, Mrs. George Savage and Mrs. Ernest Brittingham.

"Ernest Brittingham was James Brittingham's father, the one that had the strawberry place up in Salisbury," Tingle said. They owed 56 cents balance on a pair of shoes in 1911.

"After mother died I straightened up with my brother. Still have the old store

book she had from 1921," he said.

The book contains a Dec. 3, 1921, notation for pickled ribs and backbone. "Soak the blood out first, put in molasses, sugar and cayenne pepper."

And there is advice for making pickled cucumbers. "Put them in water and add a little vinegar and salt and let them boil until they begin to get tender, then pour boiling syrup over them made of vinegar and sugar."

"That was a big attraction to we boys and grown people, too. You could buy ice cream and firecrackers and other things with the tickets. Course in them days cars had cloth tops. Benny Wells had a cracker come down on his car and burned a hole in his top. Don't think the picnics lasted much longer after that, kinda died out," Tingle said.

The old store

A lot has changed, but the old church and store remain. Now empty, the store is a landmark, a kind of landmark that represents Truitt's Corner. Folks like White were sorry to see it close, but just knowing the building stands is a comfort of sorts to people.

Cars arrive in Truitt's Corner

It was on his way home from church with his family as a boy that Ralph Tingle experienced an incident that helped persuade his mother to buy a car.

"We had a horse and carriage to go to and from church. We were coming back from church one night after a revival meeting. We sent through Sears Roebuck for a lantern to fasten to the front of the carriage, but it wasn't much light. Run up on a tree, a small tree, and it turned us all, four or five head of us, right out. Turned the carriage over.

"My grandpap Truitt, mom's father, told her she could keep an automobile cheaper than she could keep a horse, but she never did get rid of the horse. Got the automobile, a Maxwell, for \$400. She never drove the automobile. But neighbors drove it for her," Tingle said.

"Harold White married my mother's sister; he got to drive it carrying us wherever we wanted to go. I wasn't old enough to drive. So after a while he had a bunch of children and I guess it was a dozen children in that car. Everybody had to

laugh when we went anywhere and stopped and all of that crew getting out of the car.

"He told mom he would trade the car in and get a bigger car, so that's what they did. After I grew up a little bigger, I didn't have no money, and my friends had their parents' cars. Mama wasn't able to buy me no car, so I was riding with my friends, going to Salisbury to the movies," he said.

"Franklin Woodcock was a land agent back then and he had two or three sales a day. From time to time he would have give away a Ford car. I was going to put my name in the barrel, but my friend told me to wait, he was older, and said wait awhile, put it on top, so that's what we did. They shook it up, drew it out and I got the car. There was nothing (fancy) on it, had to crank it, didn't have a starter, but it was a new car. It was a job to crank that thing as a boy, but I cranked it. I was the only boy around to have my own car. I had a spree then. I was old enough to work and spent every cent I could get," he laughed.

JOHN TINGLE OF DELAWARE AND KENTUCKY (ca 1760 to 1825)

Once again our dedicated staff member, Mrs. JoAnn R. Rice of Orlando, Florida, has produced an article about TINGLE family history that is most interesting. As usual she has researched the background thoroughly and documented her sources of information.

It starts with an Indenture drawn 9 April 1794 between JOHN TINGLE, house carpenter, and MARTHA, his wife, of Sussex County, Delaware, and William Ellis, planter, of the same location. It develops that the latter is a direct ancestor of one of our readers, Mrs. Dorothy W. Pepper, noted historian of Sussex County.

The parcel of land embraced 82 acres and was called FRIENDSHIP, located near the head of Perry's Creek. Originally it was in Maryland, but following settlement of the boundary dispute in 1769, the acreage then resided in Delaware. The name of JOHN TINGLE appears on the 1790 Reconstructed Census for Sussex County, Delaware. The original census was lost, and the 'reconstructed' one was prepared from names on the tax list of 1790.

JOHN TINGLE'S land adjoined that of George Derrickson (Dirickson). The latter had a daughter, ELIZABETH, who married WILLIAM TINGLE, son of ISRAEL and PARTHENIA ROBINSON TINGLE. (See Vol. 6 - No. 1, pp. 8 to 21). All of this would seem to indicate that JOHN TINGLE was somehow related to WILLIAM and ISRAEL TINGLE, but, so far, proof has eluded 'TINGLE DESCENDANTS' researchers. One problem is, too many Tingles with the first name of JOHN and WILLIAM.

We thank Mrs. Rice for the time she spent in developing her interesting story. Certainly, many Tingles and their descendants in Kentucky, and other states, now have a better understanding of their Tingle heritage.

JOHN TINGLE OF SCOTT COUNTY, KENTUCKY, ca 1760 to 1825

As most of you already know, there are many John Tingles listed in the records of Maryland, Delaware, Kentucky, and many other places.² Trying to sort them out is a little like finding a needle in a hay stack.....I have not attempted to do any sorting, but have listed the various families that lived in the same area as the John Tingle of Scott County, Kentucky. Hopefully, someone will see a familiar name that ties this family to theirs. There are many other John Tingles listed in Kentucky, in other counties; some identified, and some not.

The early history of Kentucky Counties, tells us that Fayette County was one of three large counties formed in 1780, from Kentucky County, Virginia. They were divided and subdivided many times. Scott Co.,KY. was created in 1792, from the parent county of Woodford. The county seat of Scott County is Georgetown. Before that, Woodford Co. was created from Fayette Co. in 1789. Thirty years later, Owen Co. was formed in 1819, from parts of Scott, Franklin, Gallatin and Pendleton Counties.¹⁴....All of the early Tingle families first settled in Fayette County by 1796. Some of them moved to nearby counties, while others stayed, but were within areas that became other counties. Some families appear to have moved, several times, while staying in the same place.⁵...John Tingle first appeared in a tax record of Fayette County, KY. in 1796, along with Jasper, Littleton & Thomas Tingle⁵. It appears that John probably moved into Scott County, after 1806.⁷

My first contact with John, was through a copy of a Scott County Court Order, dated 3 November, 1823. The one sentence read: "*Jno. Tingle an aged and infirm man is exempted from payment of the present and all future county levis.*"⁴

The record was located, copied and mailed to me by a Kentucky researcher, in 1989.¹ In the same mailing, was a copy of a short will for John Tingle, dated 7 February, 1825. It was the last will and testament of John Tingle, deceased. It was witnessed and proved by the oaths of Thomas Tharp & Alex Young (or Cuning). William Porter was the Executor. His wife was not mentioned in the will record, so she probably had preceded him in death. No children were mentioned either.⁶

A copy of a deed record, for John & Martha Tingle, dated 9 April, 1794, was sent to me in June of 1993, by J. Seeger Kerns, via Dorothy W. Pepper. Mrs. Pepper is descended from William Ellis, the person buying the 82 acres of land at the head of Perry's Creek, near the head of the Sound. The property had previously been owned by Nathaniel Rackliff. His adjoining neighbor was George Derrickson. The deed included all houses, out houses, orchards, fences, woods & waterways. John and Martha Tingle signed with their marks and sold their 82 acres of land, called "Friendship", for 110 pounds.³ On this deed, John Tingle was listed as being a House Carpenter.

Perhaps the couple mentioned above were selling their land, in preparation for moving to Kentucky or elsewhere? Perhaps they came with other Tingles previously mentioned in the newsletter, who settled in Fayette County, about 1794 to 1796? Tax records and census records indicate that they probably moved to Kentucky about the same time.....Wouldn't it be interesting to know how they traveled across the mountains, what they brought with them and most of all, how they were related? Did they come by wagons, horseback, or by boat? We may never have those questions answered, but by reading histories written about other pioneer travelers, we can get a pretty good idea of the hardships they faced along the way. I wonder that they had the courage to pack-up and leave in the first place!

The above mentioned will of John Tingle, does not mention sons or daughters by name, but there are a few other Tingle families of Scott and Owen Counties, Kentucky, that could be considered as candidates:

SARAH TINGLE married WILLIAM PORTER, 28 January, 1806 in Fayette County, KY. ⁷ Sarah was given permission to marry by JOHN TINGLE. It appears that this William Porter is the same as the one mentioned in John's will, above.

NANCY TINGLE married ABRAHAM HARP, 15 April, 1806, Fayette County, KY. ⁷ Nancy's father was also listed as being JOHN TINGLE. Several Harp families were listed in the census records of Scott and Owen Counties, KY., living in close proximity to the Tingles. ⁸

JEPHTHA TINGLE, born ca. 1786, Delaware, has previously been mentioned in the newsletter, as a possible son to Jasper Tingle of Fayette Co., KY. ⁴ Jephtha may also have been a brother to John and/or Jasper, as well as a possible son to one of them. Jephtha Tingle is mentioned here, because he was a resident of Scott County, KY. for at least 50 years. ^{9,16,17,18} His birthplace, Delaware, became known in the 1860 census of Owen County, KY., where he was listed as a Farmer of age 74 years; his wife, Harriet () Tingle was 69 years old, born in Virginia. They could not read or write..... His birthplace is a very good clue to where these Scott County, KY. Tingles last resided, before moving to Kentucky.....Jephtha was listed in the 1820 to 1840 census records of Scott County, KY., listing a family of four boy and two girls. In the 1840 census, he was shown on page 38, next to CALVIN TINGLE, whom I believe was Jephtha's son. ⁹.....The 1850 to 1870 census records of Scott & Owen counties listed the following families, very near to each other:

CALVIN TINGLE, born ca. 1811, Kentucky, was first shown in the 1840 census of Scott Co., KY. on p.38, as mentioned above, near JEPHTHA TINGLE. Calvin's family was listed as: 1 male under 5 yrs (b. 1835-1840); 1 male 20 to 30 yrs (b. 1810-1820); 2 females under 5 yrs (b. 1835-1840); 1 female age 30-40 yrs(b.1800-1810); total of 5 in family, with 1 in agriculture. ⁹ By 1850, when Calvin's family was being enumerated for the census of Scott Co., KY., the family was listed as follows: ¹⁰

On the same page 495 of the microfilm, just one farm away, was the family of JOHN TINGLE, born about 1820, to be listed later. ¹⁰ •

Twenty years later, Calvin and Rebecca were still living in Scott County, Kentucky, at Little Eagle. ¹² However, John and family were not living nearby.....The 1870 census of that area was recorded on June 13, 1870, as follows:

Calvin Tingle, 56, M, W, Farmer, \$200. personal property, born Kentucky, (b ca 1814).
Rebecca " , 61, F, W, Keeping House, born Penna.(ca 1809).

WILLIAM TINGLE, born ca. 1812, Kentucky, married Juliann (Ann) Lewis 11 February, 1844, Scott County, Kentucky. Their marriage bond was signed by William Tingle and James Whitton. They were married by P.H. Whitton. The bond was signed on 6 Feb., 1844. ¹⁹.....In the 1860 census of Henry Co., KY., was listed the following family. I believe they are the same couple, with six of their children listed: ²⁰

William Tingle, 48, M, Farmer, \$800. personal property, born KY.

Ann Tingle, 36, F, Keeping House, born Kentucky.

John W. Tingle, 12, M, born Kentucky (b.ca 1848)

Henry H. " , 6, M, " " (b.ca 1854)

Clarissa Jane " 3, F, " " (b.ca 1857)

GABEL TINGLE, born ca. 1813, Kentucky, may be a misspelled name for Calvin Tingle, listed above. Calvin was not listed in the index record of 1860 census of Scott County, KY, and there are several similarities between the two families:²¹

Gabel (or Calvin) Tingle, 47, M, Farmer, \$400. Personal property, born KY., (ca 1813).

Rebecca " 51, F, Keeping House, Born Penn.,(ca 1809).

Julia A. " 22, F, At Home, Born KY., (ca 1838).

William " 13, M, Born KY.,(ca 1847).

Isabel " 11, F, " " ,(ca 1849)

JOHN TINGLE, born ca. ?, probably in Kentucky, married MARY BARNHILL on 30 March, 1843, in Scott County, Kentucky. I have copies of their bond record of the 29th, and the listing of their marriage.²² John Tingle and Robert Barnhill made their marks, to sign the marriage bond. The marriage was performed by P.H. Whitton. This John Tingle may have also had the name of William. Perhaps he was named John William Tingle. I state that fact, because of another record I found in the *International Genealogical Index* (IGI) of Kentucky.²³ Listed there, is a record of WILLIAM TINGLE & MARY BARNHILL marriage on 29 March, 1843, at Scott County, KY. Another marriage for a William Tingle to Ann Roberts, 23 Oct., 1845 at Owen County, KY., was in the same IGI record.²³

WILLIAM TINGLE, born ca. 1818, Kentucky was shown in the 1870 census records as follows:²⁴

Tingle, Wm., 52, M, W, Farmer, \$200. personal property, could not read or write, a citizen of U.S., born Kentucky. (ca.1818)

Tingle, Mary, 36, F, W, Keeping House, could not read or write, born Kentucky, (ca.1834)

Tingle, Sarah, 12, F, W, At Home, Attended school with the year, born " , (ca 1858)

" Elizabeth, 9, F, W, born Kentucky, (ca 1861)

" Thomas Ann, 6, F, W, " " (ca 1864)

" Vina S., 2, F, W, " " (ca 1868)

The above William Tingle could be the same one mentioned in the 1843 marriage record, but the Mary Tingle could not be the same one, unless she married at age 9.

*JOHN TINGLE, born 1820-22, Kentucky. This John Tingle appears in the 1850 census records of Scott County, Kentucky, as mentioned above, just one farm away from Calvin Tingle and his family. ¹⁰ I believe that John and Calvin were brothers, and the sons of Jephtha and Harriet () Tingle. In that census report, John and his family were listed as follows:

John Tingle, 30, M, Farmer, \$400. real estate, born Kentucky, could not read or write.(b.ca. 1820)

Nancy " , 30, F, born Kentucky, could not read or write.(b.ca. 1820)

Eliza J. " , 11, F, " " , attending school.(b.ca. 1839)

Mary A. " , 7, F, " " " "(b.ca. 1843)

Martha " , 7, F, Twins " " " "(b.ca. 1843)

Jephtha " , 5, M, born Kentucky.(b.ca. 1845)

Harriet E. " , 3, F, " " "(b.ca. 1847)

Twenty years later, what appears to be the same John Tingle, with another wife, was listed in the 1870 census of Owen County, Kentucky, at Lusby's Mills.¹³ The youngest daughter above, was still living at home in 1870, and another son had been born. They were listed as:

Tingle John, 50, M, W, Farmer, \$1040 real estate & \$400. personal property, born Kentucky, was a citizen of U.S.(b.ca.1820)

Tingle Elizabeth, 45, F, W, Keeping House, born Kentucky, could not read or write.(b.ca. 1825)

Tingle Harriet, 22, F, W, born Kentucky, could not read or write.(b.ca. 1847-48)

" George, 17, M, W, " " " , could not write.(b.ca. 1853)

JOHN TINGLE, born ca. 1822, Kentucky, also appears in a census record of 1860, Owen County, Kentucky.¹¹ This one is a bit of a mystery, because John Tingle was not listed as the head of the household, but at the end of the Harriet ()Whitten family, as follows:

Harriet Whitten, 35, F, Farming, \$1,087. real estate, \$350. personal property, born in Kentucky, could not read or write. (b.ca. 1825)

James K. Whitten, 13, M, born Kentucky, attending school. (b.ca.1847)

Amanda J. Whitten, 10, F, " " " " (b.ca.1850)

John C. Whitten, 7, M, " " " " (b.ca.1853)

Malinda A. " 4, F, " " " " (b.ca.1856)

Sarah E. " 2, F, " " " " (b.ca.1858)

JOHN TINGLE, 38 M, Farmer, \$600. real estate, \$200. personal property, born Kentucky, could not read or write.(b.ca.1822)

It seems a bit strange, that both adults were listed, with their own property; both real and personal, but lived on the same property. Perhaps they combined their farms into one, helping each other. It is quite likely that they were brother and sister. A previous census record of her, listed with her husband, in 1850, is as follows:¹⁵

James Whitten, 39 or 59, M, Farmer, \$800. personal property, born KY.

Harriett " 25, F, Born Kentucky, could not read or write.

Garnet or Garner " 15, M, Laborer, born Kentucky.

Ann " 9, F, born Kentucky, attending school.

Amanda " 5/12, F, " " " "

The above mentioned couple married in Scott County, KY., on 1 Sept. 1845. His name was spelled WHITTON, and she was listed as Harriett TINGLE.²⁶

JEPHTHA TINGLE, born ca. 1846, was listed in the 1870 Census records of Owen County, Kentucky, on 16 June, 1870.²⁵ This Jephtha Tingle appears to be the same one listed with his father, John Tingle, in the 1850 census above.¹⁰ Young Jephtha and his family were listed in the 1870 census, as follows:

Tingle Jephtha, 24, M,W, Farmer, \$200. personal property, born Kentucky.(b.ca - 1845-46)

Tingle Sarah E., 22, F, W, Keeping house, born Kentucky.(b.ca 1848)

Tingle Cordelia, 1, F, W, born Kentucky.(b.ca 1869)

The first Jephtha Tingle and his wife, Harriet ()Tingle were not listed in any Kentucky records that I have found, after the 1860 census. My research stopped with the 1870 census records for the same area...This concludes what I have found for the Scott & Owen County Tingle families of that era.

Cheered by 40,000, ponies launch annual swim

CHINCOTEAGUE, Va. — Coast Guard Seaman Apprentice Robert Bonham held the flare aloft, pulling out the string. Thick orange smoke spiraled high above the water, signaling the cowboys waiting on nearby Assateague Island to begin the 69th annual pony swim to Chincoteague.

As the smoke dispersed into a faint pink haze, more than 100 ponies came into view on Assateague. At first barely discernible through the early morning mist, they ran in a straight line toward the channel, hesitating only slightly when they splashed into the water just after 8 a.m. yesterday.

Behind them, the cowboys shouted and cracked whips, herding stragglers into the water. In front of them, 40,000 people cheered as they watched the four-minute equine journey toward Chincoteague. The annual event, held to benefit the island's volunteer fire department, draws thousands of people from over the nation.

"Basically, you can figure the whole herd's here," said Ed Moran Sr., a past president of the fire department.

"If you don't have the stallions, the mares don't come," added Fred Hipple, another volunteer.

Chincoteague auction of foals planned today

The ponies were allowed to rest for more than an hour before being driven by the cowboys to the carnival grounds in a Pamplonaesque procession that wound through the tiny town of Chincoteague.

Today, the foals between 3 and 5 months old will be sold at an auction, which begins at 8 a.m. The rest of the herd will swim back to Assateague tomorrow. Once at the grounds, the horses were herded into a corral stocked with mounds of hay and troughs of water. As they began to eat and drink, a crowd pressed against the fence.

"I brought the credit card," said Cathy Ray, who came from North East with her two children, Matthew, 6, and Katelynn, 7, are accomplished riders and both had already picked out their favorites, she said.

The family has three horses — "and one on the way," she said, as her children, noses pressed against the mesh fence, watched the herd moving around the corral.

In the bleachers, others were sizing up the herd through binoculars.

"Our son came with the intent of buying a spotted colt, and now we've decided we're

going to get two horses — a colt and a filly," said David Wilkerson of Bowling Green, Ky.

What were the Wilkersons looking at to help them decide? The horses' general appearance, the sire and dam, the coloring — "And of course, one that looks like Misty," said his wife, Nadine. Like many children at the swim, their 12-year-old son Ryan had read Marguerite Henry's children's story, "Misty of Chincoteague."

By noon, the crowd had begun to thin out around the corral, many moving over to the carnival with its rides, oyster and clam sandwiches, and bingo game.

The day was pronounced a success by the cowboys, many of whom have participated for years in the roundup, swim and sale.

Cool weather and an early start helped make the day a good one, said Robert "Pop" Tingle, another roundup veteran.

"When you get hot, everybody gets aggravated, including the horses," he said.

"Everything went well — no problems of any kind," said Accomack County Sheriff Robert Crockett.

"I've done it all my life — I still love to do it," said Herman Daisey, 74, who helped round up the last stragglers Monday and rode with the herd yesterday.
