DALLIS BURTON (BURT) TINGLE (1879-1948)
OF ALABAMA, TEXAS AND NEW MEXICO

If there is one trait possessed by our staff member, Mrs. Ann T. Lila of Mesa, Arizona, it is certainly persistence. We are pleased to enclose copies of the seven pages she used in developing the family background of Dallis Burton Tingle, better known as 'Burt'. He was one of the eight children of Benjamin Franklin Tingle of Georgia and Alabama and a direct descendant of Solomon Tingle, Jr. of Craven County, North Carolina, who went to Georgia after his father's death in 1794/5.

Mrs. Lila writes:

"Recently, I found some descendants of Solomon Tingle, Jr., of Cherokee County, ALA, living in Willcox, AZ, that will be of interest to TD readers.

B.F. Tingle, IV, of Atlanta, GA, reminded me that there was a Baptist missionary preacher who lived at Pie Town, New Mexico, once upon a time; and a place in the area was named "Tingleville." I decided to see what I could find, and finding no such place on current maps, wrote the University of New Mexico Library inquiring about "Tingleville."

The librarian sent a photocopy of stories by a daughter and a daughter-in-law of the missionary-rancher-merchant, D.B. Tingle, who had moved to Pie Town, NM, around 1930. The daughter-in-law's story revealed that they moved to Willcox, AZ, for her husband's health in 1957, so I got her address from the Mesa Library and wrote a letter to Mrs. Lois S. Tingle who kindly replied and gave me an update on her family.

Lois drew a map of the area where they had lived in New Mexico, and marked where she thought "Tingle" used to be located. With her reply in hand, I decided to look at some old maps my son has saved for years, and soon located "Tingle," New Mexico on a 1956 Conoco Tourade map published by The H. M. Gousha Company. Apparently, the place ceased to exist between 1956 and 1970 as it was not found on our next oldest NM maps published 1970.

Now we know Burt Tingle's place in New Mexico was named TINGLE, not Tingleville. A photocopy of the 1956 map is enclosed and a copy of the stories about Dallis Burton Tingle and his son Henard Tingle as they appear in the book, FROM THE TOP OF THE MOUNTAIN. Pie Town, New Mexico and Neighbors! by Kathryn McKee Roberts; 1990, publisher unnamed. Early settlers in west central New Mexico, Burt Tingle and family were true pioneers."

Since preparing the above, Mrs. Lila received additional information from Mrs. Owassa Tingle Field of House, New Mexico and her brother, Sherman L. Tingle of Plains, Texas which we are pleased to reproduce. Mrs. Field is now 87 years old.

Thank you, Mrs. Lila, for sharing the results of your hard work with our readers. The identities of 27 Tingle descendants have now been uncovered.

Rcmagen, and in the Ruhr Pocket. We eventually helped garrison Berlin. I was discharged in 1946.

After returning home, I bought a water-well drilling rig and Dad and I drilled wells for the next fourteen years, mostly in the area around Pic Town. I played on the Pic Town baseball team that competed against Quemado, Fence Lake, Reserve and Glenwood. We had a very good team, but could never beat Fence Lake.

I moved to Quemado in 1957 and continued to drill wells, especially a lot of core drilling north of Pic Town during the uranium boom. I also worked for the Catron County Road Department of five years as a foreman.

I served on the school board in Pic Town and later as president of the consolidated district that included Horse Springs, Datil, Pic Town, and Quemado for five years.

I went to work for the Forest Service in 1965 and retired in 1986. My father died at Mangas in 1967 during the big snow. During the snow, we worked for sixteen days and nights trying to keep the roads open. The National Guard was even sent in to help.

My mother Quata, died in 1973 and is buried with my father in the family plot in the Quemado cemetery. Jo died in 1982 and is also buried there. My sister, Twauna, came to live with me in Quemado.

Looking back to my childhood in Texas, the difficult years during the depression, World War II and the decades that followed, I can safely say that I would not have missed those times for anything. We learned the hard way.

TINGLE, D.B.

D.B. (Burt) Tingle in the late 20's moved from Plains, Texas country out to the western country of New Mexico. He had heard that you could file on one section of land. His family was his wife, and five children, Owassa, Henard, Sherman, Frances, and Katie Bess. They filed on land near Atarque and had cattle there.

Paul Gainer and Owassa, Garland and Francell, and Sherm Tingle moved to Trechado in 1931. D.B. and Henard Tingle had a store there. Frances and Katie Bess went to school at Grays Chapel where Leland Hill taught school. Most of the activities we had were concerned with the church; picnics and dinners at the church. Mr. and Mrs. Watley had a ranch and invited the church for all day picnics there.

Mrs. Tingle passed away and in 1932, he married Bama Jones. They had a post office and a store and it was called "Tingle". He later traded for the Smokey Hayes ranch near Pic Town. Then they traded for the Smokey Hayes place and moved near Adams Diggins.

Our neighbors were the families of Hugh Gray, Grady Peak, Tykson, Bryon Pipe, Heck Whitley, Fred Black, and Mr. and Mrs. Whitley.

We had a friend from Tatum, N.M., Sam Schults who moved out to that country, filed on some land and built a dugout. They lived in it--planned to build a house when they could afford it. His brother and wife Mr. and Mrs. John Schults came out to visit. The ladies slept in the cellar with two children. The cellar roof caved in and smothered the wife, Mrs. Sam Schults, and one child. Mrs. John Schults raked the dirt away from her face and the little girl to try and save them. They buried Mrs. Schults and her one year old child in a homemade casket. What a tragedy.

I later married Slim Robinson, had one daughter, Geraldine. He was killed by a horse in 1939. Gerry stayed with my folks and went school at Pic Town for two years. I worked in Albuquerque. Henard married Lois Southard. They had four boys, Burton, Bill, Quenton and Bruce. Mother and Henard and Lois moved to Willcox Arizona and lived there a few years before Henard passed away in 1962.

Daddy organized churches and preached every where he went. Many souls were saved. He passed away in 1938 in Socorro.

TINGLE, HENARD

I was born near Kenna, a very small town in Roosevelt Co. in Eastern New Mexico. I went to grade school in Kenna, a small two teacher school, Junior High and High School in Elida, N.M., ten miles up the road, and on to College at what is now Eastern New Mexico University, another 2 miles up the road.

I went to Pic Town area in October, 1941 to teach at Dyke School northeast of Pic Town. This was just one of perhaps a dozen or more one teacher schools in the area. I believe I had about 12 to 14 students that year, Taylor, Lehaw, Blanton and Hedgecok, maybe one or two others for short times. Franklin Duggins was there for a short time, I know, helping "hold the school". This must have been legitimate in those days, as quite a few students did move around some when attendance fell below requirements at certain schools. Attendance was up and down, since some

students had to help in the fields at harvest time, and others took time off to help Dad peel posts for grocery money.

That winter, I boarded with the Fred Hedgecoke family, starting out with a cot in the kitchen of their two room log house. (The six of them shared the other room, which served as a living room and bedroom).

As winter progressed, I began dating Henard Tingle, who was clerking at J.A. Keele General Store. He was drafted into military service in February 1942, and the rest of our "courtship" was by correspondence and during military "Furlough" times.

Also in the winter of 1941 (November-December) the men of Dyke put up a one room log house and partitioned it to make two bedrooms. The two Hedgecoke boys shared one room and the other was my own private domain! I continued to eat with the Hedgecokes, I'm not sure now of the cost, a but it seems to me it was about \$15 a month. With no exceptions, Carrie Hedgecoke made the best "fry-bread" I've ever eaten! They also had an older daughter, Georgia, boarding in Reserve and attending High School there.

Catron County was a total change of environment, in every way from eastern New Mexico, and I did not like it at all. I loved the people, but not the terrain or the cold, snowy climate. Not wanting to "blow" my first year of teaching, I decided not to go home at Christmas, knowing that I would not return to Pie Town, if I did go home! So I spent that Christmas of 1941 with the Wesley Blanton family and I still remember it fondly as one of my most joyful Christmases.

In time, the country and the snow began to grow on me. I loved going miles, either by car, or once even on horseback to Tres Lagunas to a "Swing Game Party" through deep snow. I expect Helen Blanton Perry, Bob Blanton, and Glenn Perry still remember how cold we were when we reached Wes Blantons house about 3:30 in the morning. I thought it would never be 6:00 so Wesley would get up and build a fire!

By May, 1942, I had practically become 'a native' and would not even consider going back to Eastern New Mexico--a fact that perturbed my parents no end, since they had "pulled a few strings" to get me a teaching job 30 miles from home. But I was not interested in that, so back to Dyke I went for another term--this time spending the first half of the year in the teacherage alone, then room-board with the Frank Ray family. Students that year included Nina Blanton, Fanchon Ward, M.L. and Betty Ray, Maxine, Alta Fay, and Marie Lehw, and for a short time some of the Taylor children, and the Barnett children part of the year.

In July of 1943, Henard was discharged from the Army and we were married. We lived north of Adams Diggins, first at the Smokey Hayes place and then after a few months

moving on 7 miles north to the "old Koger place" which Henard had bought a few years earlier. I loved that farm and the spacious log house and would probably not have agreed to leave it in 1950, had there been any way to put our two boys in school. Burton was born in 1944 and Bill in 1945. Those six years on the farm, I can truthfully say, were some of my happiest years. Work? Yes. Lack of finances? Yes, but most everyone else had the same problems we did. Fun times for us consisted mainly of week-ends spent with a few couples, the Cecil Ward family, Johnny Fowler family and Frank Duggins family--playing "42" dominoes and just visiting, and always plenty of good food. The locations were rotated from week to week, so we all go a turn as "hosts".

Church was held on a regular basis but only once a month for awhile. We'd have morning "preaching", then a pot luck lunch and an afternoon preaching, with an occasional "Fifth-Sunday" all day meeting of all the churches. Some of the pastors I remember were D.B. Tingle, Henard's dad, L.F. (Red) Guinn, Arvle Moore and Grady Barnett. For awhile, services were held at our home, kind of a central location for those attending, then in warmer weather, going on farther north to the Chock Brannin home on the plains. Later, as the folks "up North" moved, we began to meet at Adams Diggins school house which was more accessible to some other families--the Paul Magees, Ollie Magee, Joe and Cotton Hogsett and on occasion the Red Davis families. Davis's lived way down the draw. (If I've left out anyone, please forgive me.) The earlier meetings at our home, included the J.C. Browns and their families who visited often from the Hurley Mine country, Jim Hoggs, Chock Brannins, Tingles, Barnetts, Moores, and the Guinns came up from the Augustine plains to preach some Sundays.

In the late 1940's a government program for veterans was a boon to "poor farmers" for a few years. For attending class in town on given nights and through certain kinds of farm practices, they received a monthly check. This check is what kept us going from one harvest to another, along with Mr. Keele's ever-ready credit. Through these classes, we made more friends that we'd only met casually in the past.

Our third son Quentin was born in Dec, 1949. He doesn't remember much about farm-life there, except for two summers, 1962 and 1963, which he spent with our near neighbor and good friend, J. H. M'Nabb. Mac and Henard almost always worked together at crop gathering time, and a lot of times were joined by Jim Hogg and Loy Cox. Work goes a lot quicker with several and they'd go from farm to farm with whatever equipment they had. When they worked at our place, I enjoyed the extra people around and I always enjoyed the cooking for hungry men. When they were at another farm, that was a different story--it was all mine. Cows to feed and milk, chickens and pigs to shuck corn for and tend, kids to tend, wood to chop--all the things that keeps a home on the farm going, and most of the time without a car.

For back in the 40's how many of us were two car families? What a contrast to the late 60's and early 70's when our four sons were grown and we were then a several car family. Bruce, our fourth son was born in 1953, after we moved to Pic Town living in the house behind the hill from Keeles store.

Some of the teachers I remember there were Colita Schalbar, Guy Magee, of course was everyone's favorite "Fessor", as most of the kids called him. Some others were Ray Pennington, now in Washington state; John and Jessie Moore were there in 1957, Miss Frances Steck, Bill Benson, and Mr. Hutchison. I tried teaching a couple of times, but with four kids, it didn't work out, so I didn't stay too long. Some of the good cooks along the way were, Gladys Ward, Ruby Blanton, Mary Dell Vaughn. Daisy Magee, "Fessors" wife was always available to help out whenever needed and was loved by all.

During the years I worked part time at Mr. Hickey's store and now and then at Mr. Keele's. Henard worked at a number of different jobs--driving the school bus to Quemado, driving a cattle truck, hauling wood to Texas, carpenters helper with Hillery Summers. Through this work relationship, we built up a close and loving friendship with Hillery and Polly that still lasts.

In 1953, Henard's health began to fail and so with the cold weather, high altitude and all the other hardships, we began considering alternatives to living at Pic Town. So in 1957, we moved to Willcox, Arizona. It has been a good move from many standpoints. Henard's health did improve, temporarily.

When we left Pic Town, the Postmaster there, Clark Turner suggested I apply at the Post Office. I did not get on right away, but eventually went to work for the post office and retired from there in 1985. On March 2, 1962, the Lord called Henard home.

We stayed on in Willcox, and the boys finished school there. Burton is a High School math teacher & coach. He married Barbara and they have two daughters, Donita, 14 yrs. and Melissa, 11 yrs. Bill went to college, then into the service. He married Mary K. and they have three children, Beth, 15, Lori 12, and Danny 10. He is in construction. Quentin and Barbara own training stables. They have Jeff, Frank and Darlene. Bruce and Joyce have Amy 13, Troy 9, Dwight 6, and Terry 4. He is a meterman.

Pic Town has many happy memories for us. The "fun" activities; the Saturday night movies at the Farm Bureau, the skating rink, all the school activities, the P.T.A, the Bingo party, annual Christmas Dinner, the ball games, especially between parents and students. My kids say, "Mom remember when YOU pitched for the women's games?" I do

remember with pleasure, but as they say, "Bet you couldn't do that, now!" I have to agree--thirty years have taken its toll!

Clark and I were born and grew up in San Saba County. We had moved around a lot and had all kinds of jobs.

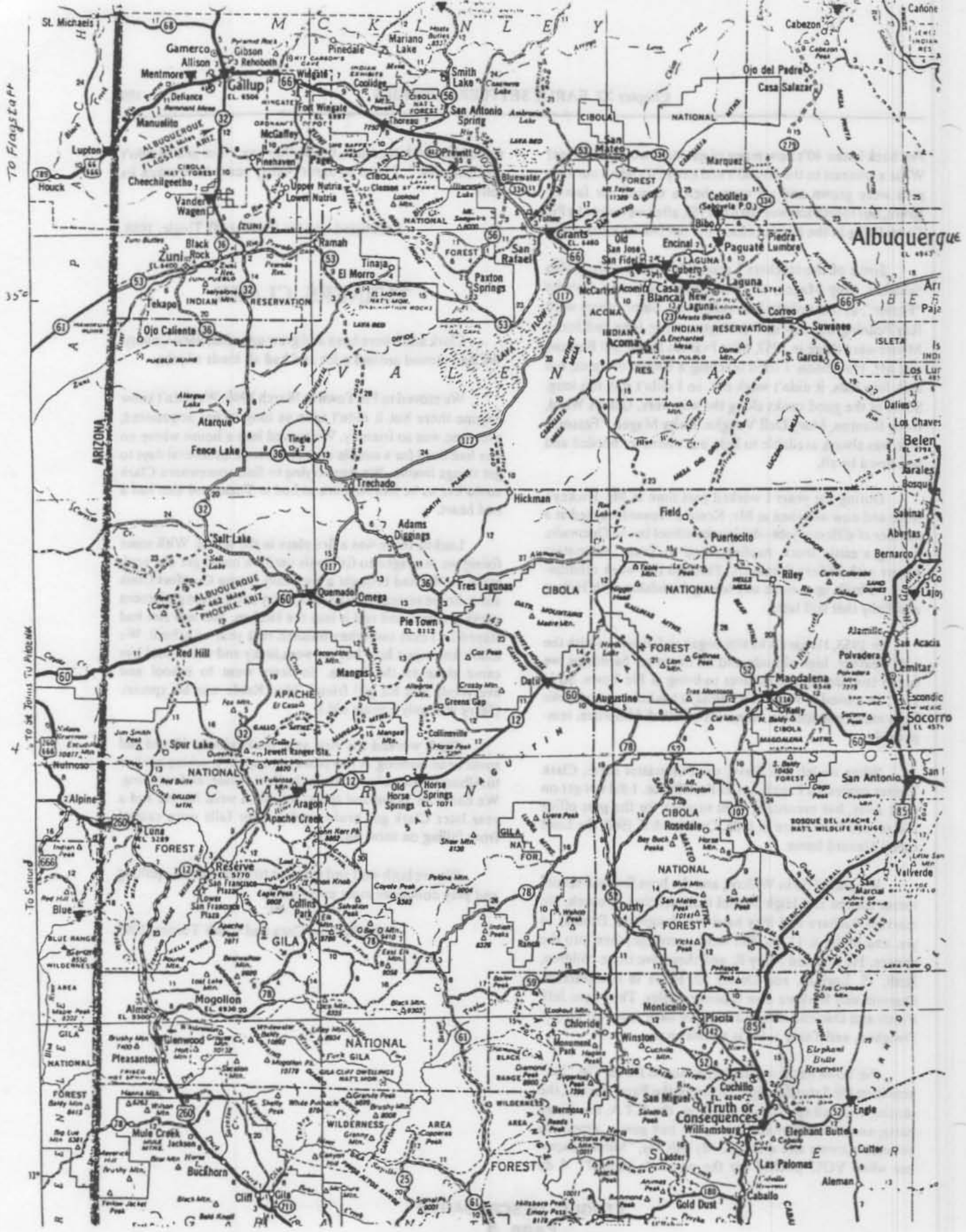

We moved into a house where no one had lived for a couple of years. It took us several days to get things livable. We were trying to find somewhere Clark could live as he had Asthma so bad in Texas and also had a bad heart.

Luckily there was a fire place in the house. With some fixing, we managed to fix meals until we could get our cook stove in. We had brought a big heavy Home Comfort Cook stove. So we rested before Clark, Jerry and I could get broom sticks under it and roll it into the kitchen. Joe and Jim had stayed in Texas until they finished that year of school. We didn't know just how but we were lucky and the school bus came close to the house. So Jerry went to school and everybody was his girl friend. Mrs. Keele was his special. (Jerry was only 6 years old.)

Clark worked the first year on Highway 60 and did some bean farming. A few years were spent trucking lumber to Albuquerque, a few years in the Post Office, and ranching. We had a lot of fun and spills. A broken wrist for me and a year later Clark got broken pelvis. Our falls were caused from falling on snow and ice.

We are both well and still able to go to church, quilting and play dominoes most every week.

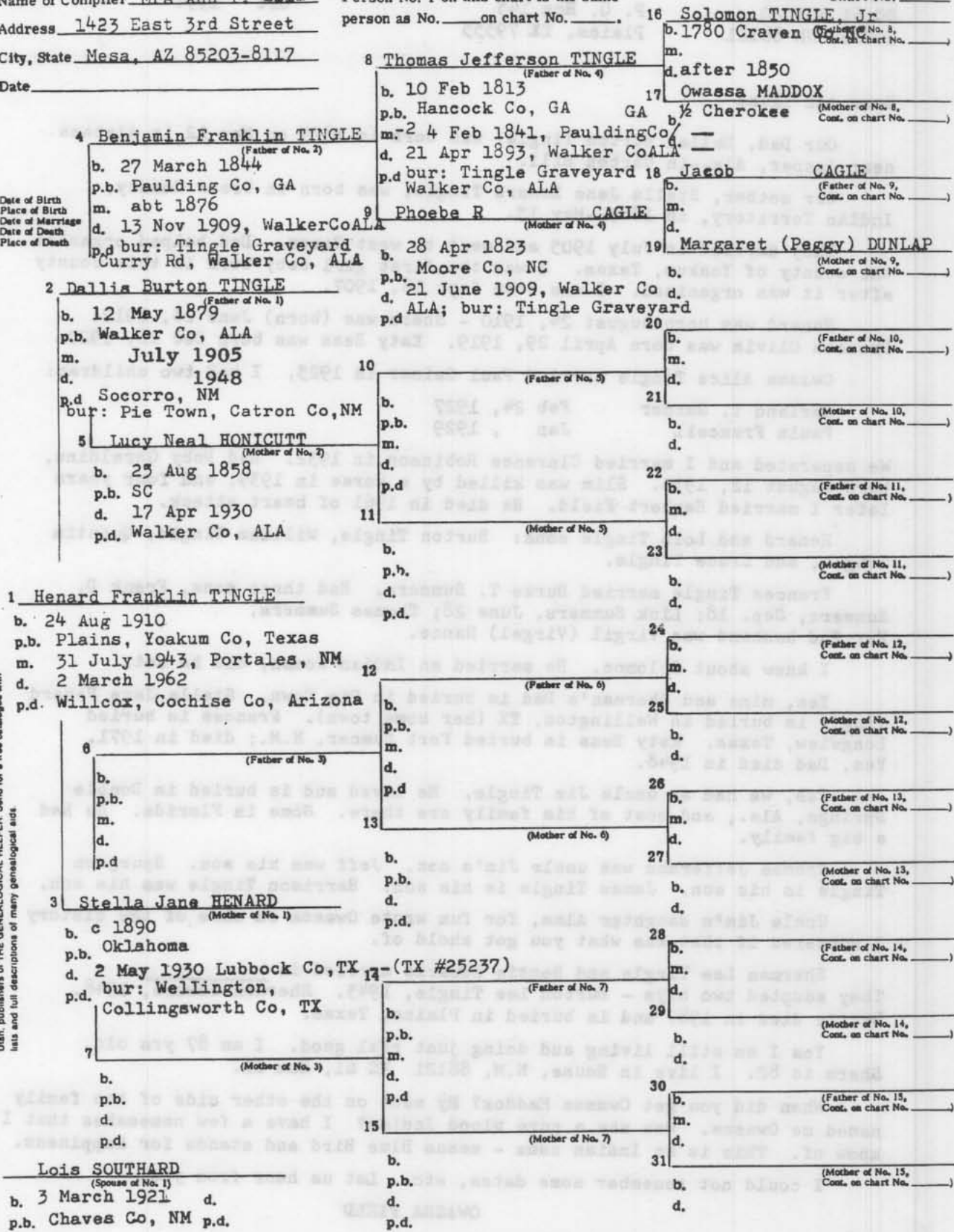
Ancestor Chart

TINGLE DESCENDANTS

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A few thumbnail sketches

When the children of James Amos Tingle and his wife, Callie Brownlee Tingle grew up they all left home and went in the following directions:

Robert Newton Tingle (Newt) moved into town (Forsyth, GA) and soon became owner and operator of Tingle's Garage where he fixed everything from toasters to tractors for the rest of his life. He was a well-respected member of the community and loved by all. Newt married Ethel Lawrence. They had two daughters, Betty and Peggy, who collectively gave them six grandchildren.

James Grady Tingle (Grady) worked as a teller in the bank in Forsyth for a while. He eventually married Marian Gay and moved to Florida where he became proprietor of a very successful business, the Tingle Paint Company. Like his brothers, and many other young men of the time, Grady tried his hand at "inventing" new mechanical things. For instance, he designed and built a three-wheeled car which was called a "Tinglemobile." This novel vehicle was featured on a Pathe newsreel segment. Grady and Marian had no children.

Daniel Whitney Tingle (Dan) worked in Forsyth for a while as the town's Moving Picture Operator. He ran the projector, his brother, Newt, kept the machine in good working order and the entire Tingle family received free passes for all the movies.

In 1913, Dan enlisted in the Army Field Artillery and became part of the Army Air Corps in 1923. He served in France during World War I from 1918 to 1920 and in England, among other places in World War II.

While he was stationed in Michigan he met and married Helen V. Barrett from Port Huron, in 1928. They had four children, Moira M., Helen T., Constance A., and Bonnie C. Dan retired in 1946 after thirty-three years of service. His rank ranged from Private to Lieutenant Colonel (wartime commission). The family settled in Hampton, Virginia. Dan and Helen are survived by seven grandchildren and fourteen great grandchildren.

Marie Tingle graduated from Bessie Tift [College] in Forsyth. She married Reverend William Park Brooks (Will) and moved to Florida where they served in one community for most of their life. Marie and Will had no children.

Mary Jane Tingle (Mary) graduated from Bessie Tift and went on to further perfect her chosen career which was teaching. She started out with the younger children and by the time she retired she had spent a good many years as a full Professor of English at the University of Georgia. Mary presently resides in Jackson, Georgia. She never married.

A couple of Whimsies

In all the places we traveled and all the schools we attended I have met only one Tingle and heard of one other outside of my family circle. So, when the TINGLE DESCENDANTS newsletters began to come in, I decided to watch to see if these two people might cross its pages.

The first one I looked for was a very sweet young man I met during the summer of 1949. He was stationed at Fort Eustis and came to visit us a few times before he was transferred. When asked, my father said he did not think we were from the same family of Tingles because he did not know of any relatives in Mississippi. The last time I heard from him was in 1952. He had just come back from Korea. Sadly, that tall, slim, nice-looking boy turned up in the last newsletter. His name was Leonard Earl Tingle and it looks as if we were parallel cousins.

The other Tingle I am waiting to see come by is one we never met but if the family story is correct he played a part in shaping the change in direction our family's life took in December of 1933 when my father was the only one in his squadron to receive orders for a tour of service in the Philippines. He wondered why he was singled out for this assignment but a lowly Tech Sergeant had no recourse other than to obey his Commanding Officer's orders. So, we all got in the car and my father drove us to San Francisco where we boarded an army transport and set out on a month long trip across the Pacific Ocean.

When the transport stopped in Hawaii en route to the Philippines, a group of people came on board looking for their friend, Dan Tingle. They had seen his name on the passenger list and were prepared to welcome him with a party.

As it turned out, a Dan Tingle stationed at Langley Field in Virginia was about to retire and either had requested or needed an overseas assignment before he left the military. Apparently the wrong file had been pulled. That may be how my parents and their three children, ages four, three and one year wound up spending two years in the Philippines.

When we returned to the states, my father reported for duty at Langley Field. We went on to other places but when my father retired our family settled in Hampton, Virginia. So, you see, the other Dan Tingle is sort of woven into my family history.
